Don't miss out on the last weekend of Stingy Jack's Pumpkin Patch. Corn mazes, hay rides, live music, an illuminated pumpkin trail, and over 50 local artists and merchants are there for your delight.

The festival is located in Pisgah Forest and all ages will enjoy the spectacle of it. The fun begins after you park your car off of Asheville Highway near McGuire Road. Parking fees are \$5 per car. First you ride the Stingy trolley to the entrance of the mountains.

Start off the night by getting lost in the corn maze or enjoying the hayride that is located by the creek. While making your way to these attractions don't miss out on the gifts and crafts brought to you by local merchants. There are plenty of food and drink choices.

Beginning at 5 p.m. you can experience storytelling accompanied by chainsaw art. Wondering what chainsaw art is? Well go find out! Live music includes 45 Cherry on Saturday Oct. 29 and The Ross Brothers and Gardner Hathaway on Sunday Oct. 30.

As the sun sets the main attraction is lit up. In total there are over a thousand pumpkins carved into scenes created by local artists

along Stingy's illuminated pumpkin trails. Each scene has a different theme. Some include a rainforest, pirates, and mythical beasts.

Another high point of Stingy Jack's is that they are partnering with Bread of Life which is a food bank and free community kitchen in downtown Brevard. It serves approximately 180 people every day. A portion of ticket sales will be donated to Bread of Life.

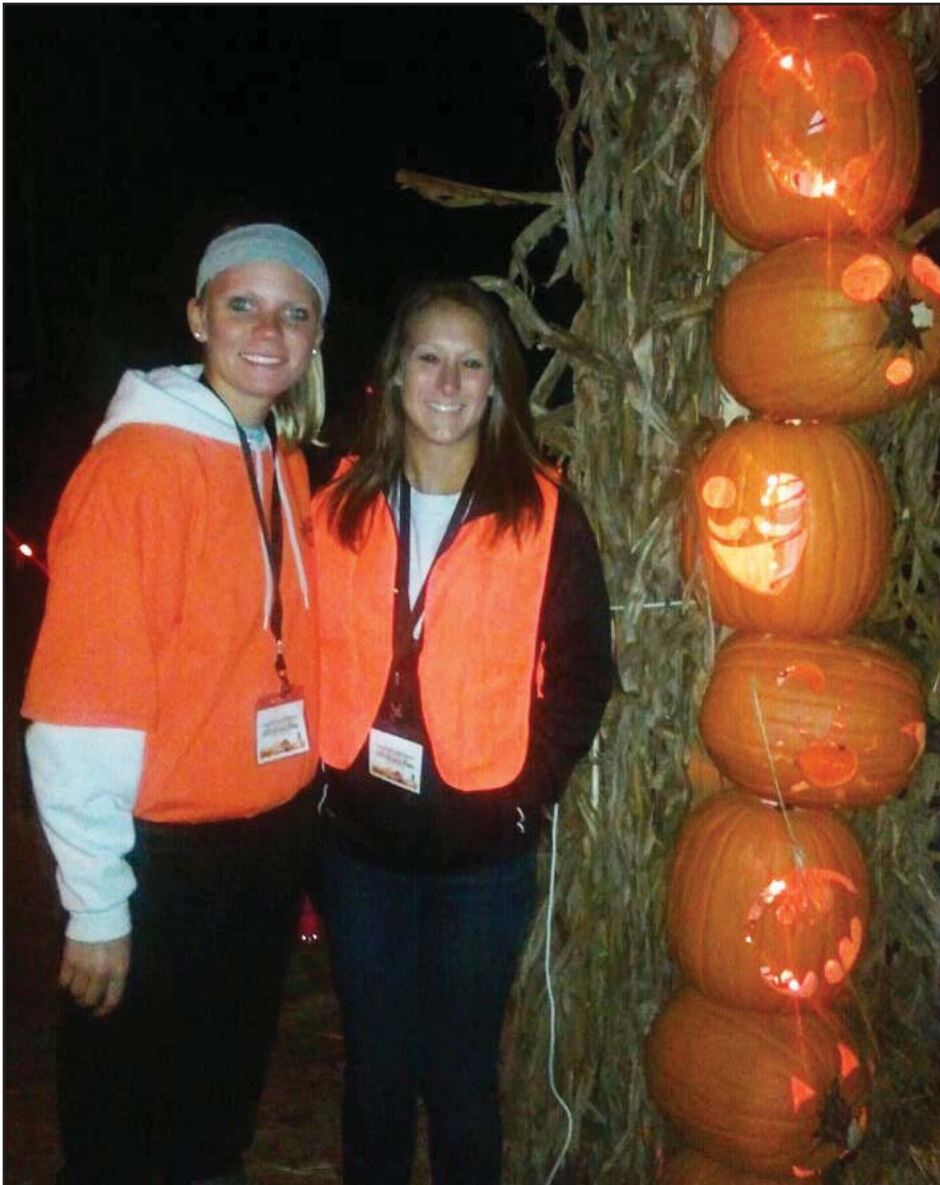
Security update on campus
