
Security on campus Poverty

Campus charges dropped in Nov. 5 incident

Campus charges have been dropped against five students accused of an incident that took place in a residence hall Nov. 5.

Details of the incident have not been made public by campus officials, but Dean of Students Chris Holland confirmed that "at this time, all charges that violated our social code review process have been dropped."

On Monday, temporary suspensions against the five students were lifted following a judicial board hearing, thus allowing them to return to campus and resume classes. Two of the students, however, have left the college.

The Brevard Police Department continue to investigate the incident, but so far, no criminal charges have been filed against anyone involved in the incident.
