Prison books project

Brevard Colleges newly formed Criminal Justice Club has joined in the hunt for book donations. It is a group effort between the Art, English, and Criminal Justice department to gather donated books to send to indigent inmates. Working closely with the Asheville Prison Books Program, which is a volunteer run non-profit organization, the books will be sent to prison facilities in North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Tennessee.

Ashville Prison Books says "we are always in need of books, especially Dictionaries and Legal Aid materials. The main source of income for Prison Books is through donated materials. Books that are not mailed to prisoners can be sold to local bookstores in exchange for store credit or cash". By giving these books we can help offer men and women behind bars the opportunity for selfempowerment, education, and entertainment that reading provides. "Education is the only tool proven to help prevent people from returning to prison again and again" (Asheville Prison Books Program).

The way this process works is by reading the requests for material and finding the donated books in the Prison Books Projects' accumulated library. "The Prison Book Program receives hundreds of letters every month with requests for mostly educational, cultural, legal, and recreational reading materials. Prisoners simply have to send a letter and we will send books. Each request is met with a package of available materials from our stock of donated books, a handwritten response and The National Prisoner Resource List" (Asheville Prison Books Program).
