Mailroom vandalism

Recent break-ins at the Brevard College post office have led staff to shut the mail room down after 2 p.m. Several packages have been stolen, mostly containing cookies and baked goods from home, although one package stolen from a student was worth more than \$200.

Security Director Stan Jacobsen thought the thieves might be getting in with a copied master key. "I changed the lock and installed a deadbolt, and they got in again," Jacobsen said.

After the second break in, it was discovered that the thieves are scaling the lockboxes and shimmying through the small space above. A bar exists above the P.O. Boxes, but there is space small enough for a thin person to squeeze through. It has not been determined whether or not the culprit is a Brevard student.

Brevard Police are involved, and tampering with mail is a federal offense. The campus mail room will remain closed after 2 p.m. until a secure way to keep people from climbing over the mailboxes has been implemented.
