
Organ Installed

Louisburg College has been given a pipe organ by the alumni. The organ, located in Benson Chapel, will be dedicated to Sarah Foster, Professor Emeritus of Music, at a ceremony later in the year.

The organ was purchased from Randall Dyer and Associates of Jefferson City, Tennessee, and cost approximately \$60,000. I interviewed Bradley Jones and Jeff Weiler, both tonal directors for Randall Dyer, who have been putting the finishing touches on the organ. Jones and Weiler said that the organ is totally custom designed for the room it is placed in, from the wooden architecture to the size of the pipes.
