
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Black Cultural Center

WE GOT IT! In 1848, students at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill requested a campus ballroom- and they got it. (Smith Hall. 1851) In the 1920's, they asked for a campus theater to promote folk drama and they got it. Four years ago, black students at UNC petitioned for a Black Cultural Center (Playmakers Theatre) to promote black cultural and literary endeavors on campus- and we got it! The Black Cultural Center, BCC, is a milestone in the University's history, a (Black Cultural Center, 1988) history that includes the admission of the first black student, Edward Diggs, in 1951; the development of the African/Afro-American Studies degree program in 1969; and the newly established doctoral minor in Afro-American literature. 
