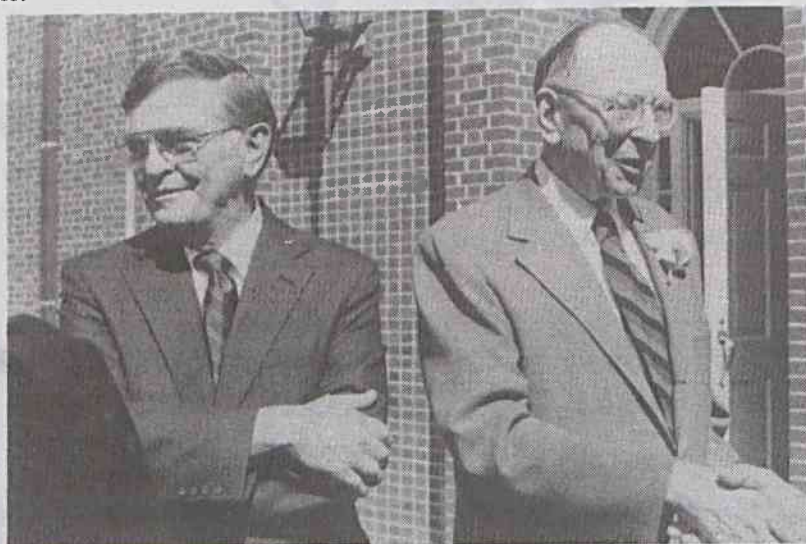


**1985**

UNCW becomes member of the Colonial Athletic Association.

UNCW designated a Comprehensive Level I institution.

Charles Cahill appointed provost in 1985 in addition to his duties as vice chancellor of academic affairs and professor of chemistry.

**1986**

F. Douglas Moore appointed vice chancellor of university advancement in June 1986.

**1988-89**

Graduate School established. Graduate programs opened in biology, chemistry, English, history, mathematics, and Master of Arts in Teaching.

**1989**

Office of International Programs established.

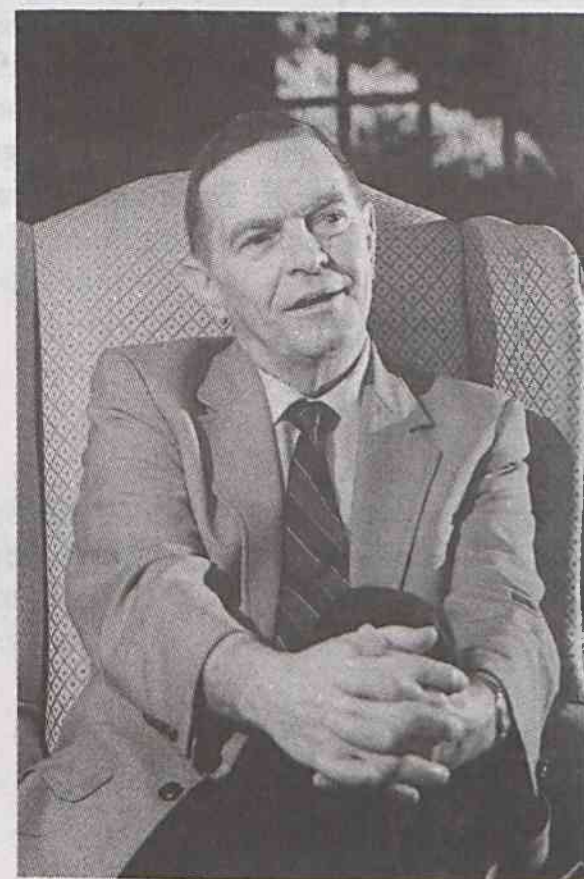
**1989**

Fall semester 1989 - beginning of the first Ph.D. program at UNCW in marine science as an interinstitutional cooperative with North Carolina State University.

**1990**

In February 1990, the N.C. Biotechnology Center awarded a \$100,000 grant to UNCW to establish a permanent multidisciplinary biotechnology program in marine botany.

The management site of North Carolina's four National Estuarine Research Reserves and two coastal reserves was relocated from Raleigh to UNCW's Center for Marine Science Research in April 1990.
