Currently five players are averaging in double figures as the team has been scoring 87.2 points per game. Junior Dave Borman tops the list with a 21.1 mark-well ahead of second-place Carl Martin who is scoring at a

Will Franklin, the 6-10 low post man, has been one of the more consistent per formers in building a 12.2 scoring average. Soph Nor-man Mukes' average has dipped slightly to 11.8.

Scoring 10.1 points per game is 6-11 Lester Stinson who has been a key figure in the Bulldogs' success since the WBTV Carolina Classic.

Injuries kept Stinson side lined during first semester, but in eight games he has displayed a flair for excitement. An intimidating figure under the basket, Stinson has connected on 59.2 per cent of his field goal attempts and 80.9 per ce of his free throw tries. While alternating with Franklin, he has grabbed nearly six rebounds per game.

Four starters carry impressive shooting creden tials. Mukes is shooting 55.8 per cent from the floor while the soft-shooting Borman is at 54.9. Franklin is successful 54.8 per cent of the time and Martin makes good on 53.3 per cent of his attempts.

From the foul line, Mitchell is the leader with cent. Pait is next with an 81.6 mark, followed by Stin-son and Martin at 79.7. Overall, the 'Dogs are one of the better foul shooting teams in the school's history

Bob Bolick, a four-year starter for the Bulldogs foot ball team, has been named to the second team of the NAIA All-American squad and defensive back William Peppers has been named an honorable mention American

Both were also selected to the All-South Atlantic Con ference and All-District 26 teams.

Voted to the All-SAC-8 second team by the league coaches were sophomore running back Po Rogers and sophomore defensive end Monte Walker.

Bolick, 6-4, 260, is an offensive tackle who has at-tracted the interest of several professional teams. The

National Football League draft will be held Feb. 3-4.

Also a senior, Peppers as the 'Dogs most valuable defensive back as a sophomore and junior. He led the team in interceptions this season with four and picked off 14 during his career

Rutherford, Lee Sign with 'Dogs

Greg Rutherford, a 6-3, 255-pound defensive tackle from Morganton, has signed a grant-in-aid with Gardner Webb. He is the first high

school recruit to sign with the Bulldogs.
Rutherford was an all-con-

ference performer at Morganton's Freedom High where he was twice named player-of-the-week in North Carolina. The Patriots, 11-1 this past season, won the Western 4-A Conference championship and was eliminated by East Forsyth in the quarterfinals of the state

playoffs.
"Greg ranked at the top of our list," said assistant coach Jim Gudger. "We feel he is one of the most outstanding defensive tackles we have ever seen. He has a very good chance of playing for us as a freshman.

Rutherford is the second recruit to be announced by the Bulldogs. Earlier head coach Oval Jaynes an-nounced the signing of Alvin Lee of Shelby, who played free safety this past season as a freshman at Western Carolina.

Lee, a former running back at Crest who was heavily recruited by the Bulldogs as a high school senior, Lee is 6-2, 180-pounds. A 9.7 sprinter, he is capable of playing as a run ning back, defensive back or wide receiver.
