The highly anticipated Safe Ride program scheduled to begin this fall remains dormant. Student Government Association (SGA) representatives remain optimistic about the idea but have no implementation date as yet. SGA members have cited problems with student organization involvement and legality issues as reasons why the program is not yet operational.

"I think it's an excellent idea, and I hope we can find the leadership to make it happen," SGA President Katie Russell, said

# Police draw attention to downtown safety issues

Programs such as the Student Government Association's Safe Ride initiative have brought attention to the issue of student safety in downtown Wilmington. The proliferation of drinking associated with the bar and club scenes increases the potential of victimization in this area and the need for students to be aware of safety precautions.

"Intoxicated individuals have a 30 to 40 percent higher chance of being victims of violent crimes, including assault and robberies," said New Hanover County Deputy Sheriff J.R. Sigman

Over the past three years, assaults in the areas around Front Street appear to be declining based on police reports. In 1998, 18 assaults were reported, 1999 ten assaults were reported and only three have been reported for 2000.

However, according to Officer Verna Atwood, of the Wilmington Police Department's Crime Preven-

tion Unit of the, these statistics may be misleading because they do not account for those assaults that went unreported over the recorded years. She said that it was impossible to estimate the frequency of unreported incidents
