Men's basketball rolls in exhibition game

Once they found their rhythm, the UNC Wilmington men's basketball team picked up the pace to trample the Charlotte Stars, 87-57 in an exhibition game last Saturday.

"[With] first game jitters, it's going to take a matter of time before we shake it off," junior Ed Williams said.

"Some of our new kids... got an opportunity to get their feet wet," said UNCW Head Coach Jerry Wainwright, as the team's four active freshmen combined for 29 points.

The Seahawks took control of the ball at the tip-off, and sophomore Brett Blizzard hit a quick three-pointer, while Williams scored a basket to jump to a five-point lead in the first minute of the game. The Stars closed the gap to two at the 14:14 mark, when Dale Cook made a layup for Charlotte to create a score of 11-9, but that was as close as they were able to get for the rest of the game. Blizzard and Stewart Hare combined for seven points to spurt a 9-3 run and establish an eight-point advantage with 6:30 to go in the half. Neither team dominated during the remainder of the half, leaving UNCW to enter the locker room with a 37-28 lead.

In the second half, the Seahawks' pre-season conditioning proved to have a positive effect, as they maintained the fast-paced tempo and full-court pressure that built the nine-point halftime lead. Despite being short-handed due to the absence of seniors Dominick Scott and Marcus Green, as well as freshman Brandon Clifford, UNCW was able to employ a full-court press for the extent of the game. The execution of the press was weak at times, but the Seahawks compensated with their quickness.

"I thought we got into [the press]," Wainwright commented. "I don't think we came out of it too well."

"[The press] is probably our weakest point right now," said Blizzard, who tied Williams

Top ranked Eagles soar past Seahawks

UNC Wilmington volleyball was in action last Friday night at Hanover Hall against American University, ranked at the top of the conference. The Eagles took the match in three straight games, 15-10, 15-4, 15-11. The Seahawks now stand 4-22 overall and 0-9 in the Colonial Athletic Association.

The Eagles jumped out to an early 2-0 lead in the first game. However, the high
