Seahawk Grille update Re-opening delayed

The opening of the Seahawk Grille, located in the Warwick Center in what is known as Center Stage, has been postponed.

The Grille, originally scheduled to open on Sept. 13, has been rescheduled to open on Monday, Sept. 20 due to construction problems.

"We have run into a few construction delays related mostly to design work done by our general contractor based on blueprints of the Warwick Center," said Food Service Director JP Fesperman. "For example, our general contractor found the drain lines to not be located where the plans show. Since everything is on a concrete slab and you must cut the concrete to make any changes, it slows down the process."

The Grille is not only used as a dining area, the space is utilized by many student groups who need a place to meet.
