

Geffert

Dr. Geffert born and raised in Chicago, attended school at the Universities of Virginia and Indiana and the University of California at Berkeley, and spent one year at the University of Marburg in Germany. Geffert, who came to St. Andrews from the University of Chicago in 1963, has been the head of the Student-Faculty Appellate Board and is now a member of the Faculty Executive Board, the Steering Committee, the Long-Range Planning Committee and the Faculty Sponsor for Student Republicans.

When asked why he has remained at St. Andrews, Geffert stated that, like many of the St. Andrews Faculty, he has taught at a large university but would rather teach in a smaller school. He prefers the individualized instruction possible in smaller classes to the more impersonal seminar or lecture formats of large institutions.

During the time over the year that Dr. Geffert has been here, he has seen

the attitudes of the college move from conservative to ultra-liberal and now, back to conservative.

Geffert believes that one of the most valuable changes that could come of this movement is a stricter interpretation of the Honor Code.

While teaching at the University of Virginia (UVA), he was impressed with the honor code system as it was practiced there. At UVA each student was obligated to observe the system which entailed no lying, no stealing and no cheating. Students who disobeyed the Code and students who failed to report such offenders are equally guilty and were dealt with severely.

Because this code promotes trust between the students themselves as well as between the students and faculty, Geffert thinks that the enforcement of this type of honor code would be beneficial to St. Andrews, both as a school and as a community.

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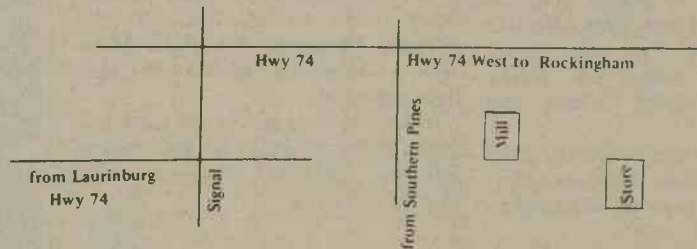
