On December 5, Miss Anneliese Schober, soprano, head of the voice department, and director of the Choral Olub at Flora Macdonald College, was presented in a voice recital in the college auditorium.

Miss Schober's varied program included works by J. S. Bach, Hienrich Albert, Zelter, Johannes Brahms, Hugo Wolfe, Gabriel Flaure, Claude Debussy, Guiseppe Verdi, Ralph Vaughn Williams, and J. Turina. Included in Miss Schober's encores were Franz Schubert's "Who Is Sylvia?" sung in the original Shakespearean text; and a group of three songs - "Crown The King With Carrot Tops," "Ophelia's Lament," and "Cantticle from the Song of Songs." It is interesting to note that the latter group of songs was written by one of Miss Schober's friends, Miss Vinginia Carson, and has since been dedicated to her.

Accompanying Miss Schober at the piano was Professor John E. Williams, at the flute, Miss Joyce Bryant, and at the organ, Miss Ginny Woods.
