If the Assembly proves the recommendation, \$32 will be spent towards remodelling tler Hall for men students. It is peeted that the fellowing improveents be made:

1. Painting the entire interior

2. Replacing all doors and instal-

3. Sanding and refinishing all

4. Replacing all furniture and proding some equipment for recreation

A sum of fifteen thousands dollars has been proposed for the purpose of purchasing much needed equipment or the Infirmary, Gymnasium and the Science Building. Funds would be usto complete the equipment of the bifirmary, primarily in the kitchen. The Gymnasium funds would be used provide Venetian blinds, a curtain and seats for the Little Theater.

The Science Building expenditures would include, with Venetian blinds where needed, equipment for a teachers rest room and teaching equipment. his would include a substantial amount of much needed audio-visual equipment for the specific use of the nce department.
