

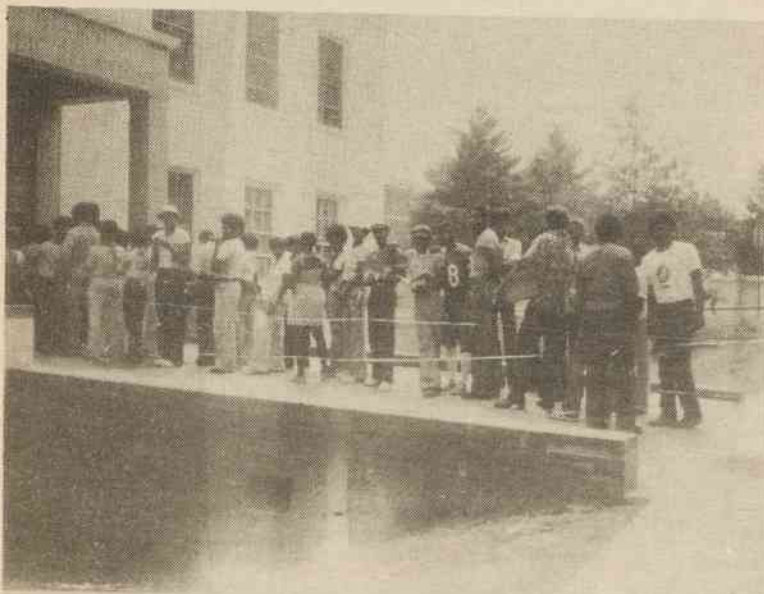

'75 Brings Record Enrollment

Approximately 2000 students are expected to register for the fall semester at Winston-Salem State University. Slightly more than 500 freshmen and transfer students began orientation on campus on Wednesday, August 20

and will register for classes on Monday, August 25. About 1500 upperclassmen are scheduled to register on Tuesday, August 26 and Wednesday, August 27.

Applications for continuing education classes are still being

accepted. Those students will register during a special session at 6:00 P.M. on Tuesday, August 26.

Classes will begin on Thursday, August 28. The fall semester ends December 18.

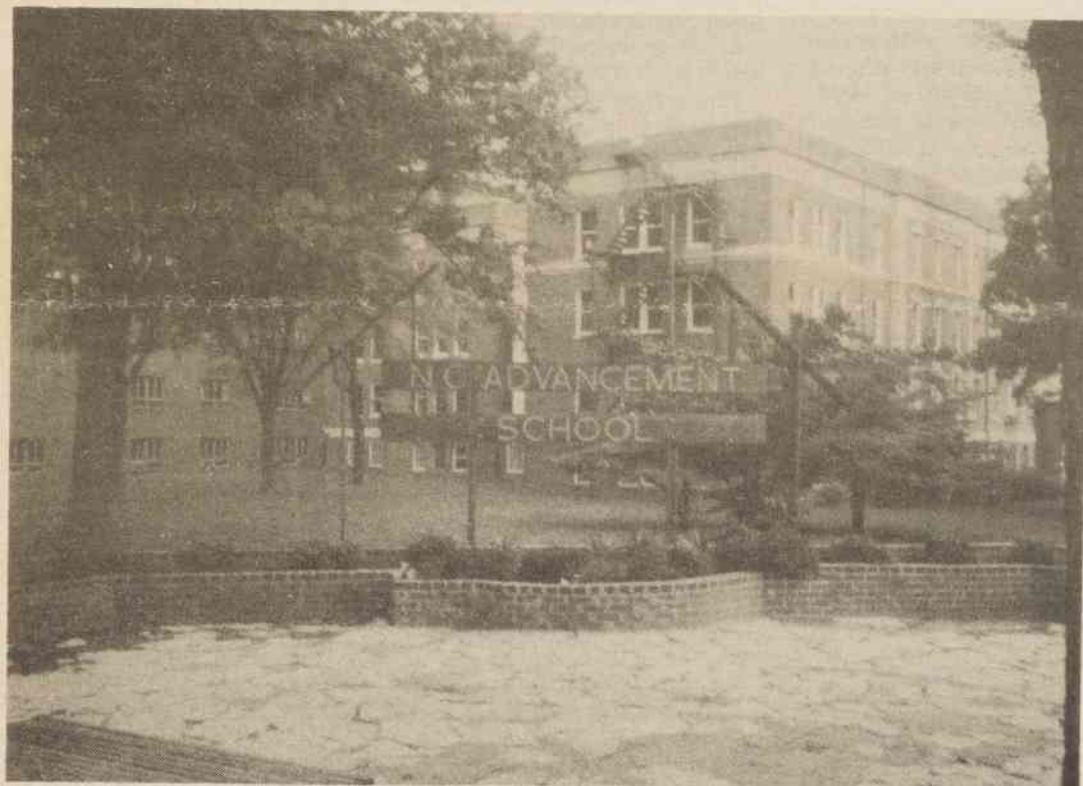

New Program At WSSU

Welcome Freshmen and Returning Students!!! The Housing Management Program is a new addition to the Winston-Salem State University campus. Here is a brief review of our program and its history.

THE HOUSING MANAGEMENT PROGRAM IN REVIEW

Winston-Salem State University became the recipient of a \$135,000 Grant from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) on March 3, 1975. Winston-Salem State is one of five

Universities throughout the country in the HUD Program. The others are: Howard University of Washington, D.C., Temple University of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Southern University of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, and Texas Southern of Houston, Texas.

The program at Winston-Salem State University has been designed to prepare highly qualified and effective managers. Participants will major in Business Administration with a concentration in Housing Management. This Housing

Management Program has been designed to accommodate the following categories of students: (a) Housing Authority Personnel.

(b) Private Housing Personnel. (c) Winston-Salem State University and other college students, and others interested in this general area of study.

Practitioners and other adults interested in upgrading skills, changing career paths, or gaining enrichment for self-fulfillment, may enroll in one or more courses, workshops, or seminars for credit or non-credit.
