On the eve of ending another season, head coach Bill Hayes finishes his sixth year as coach of the Rams football squad. Hayes will also be completing his fifth consecutive winning season as Ram coach.

In 1977, WSSU went 10-0 and captured the first CIAA Title and Championship under Hayes' leadership. Hayes, a 16 year veteran at the art of coaching, has spread his roots into coaching other sports.

"Through my years of coaching, I have also coached basketball, track, and tennis," said Hayes.
