
Teila Hand, a rising junior with a double major in English and History, will serve as vice-president of WSSU's Student Government Association for the 1989-90 academic year.

# Rams Join U.S. Army Reserves Program

Many students, past and present, have joined forces with the U.S. Army Reserve, and according to them, it was a decision that wasn't all that difficult.

With the U.S. Army Reserve Program

ing done during the summer), GI Bill (\$5,040 to help with education), Student Loan Forgiveness (\$20,000 for loan repayment past or present or future loans), Cash Enlistment Bonus (\$2,000 cash money for enlistment) and in just one enlistment a part-time income of over

each one is entitled to skill training (train- \$20,000. All of this and the U.S. Army possible Commissions later. Reserve will not interfere with school or anything else they may get going in the future as they only work one weekend per month. They all saw the Reserves as a way to get solid, paid training for a career part-time, and a way to help take care of some of their education expenses, and
