Carole Fuller Nicholson has assumed full-time teaching duties in the Department of Fine Arts after serving as a part-time instructor in music for the past 18 years. She is serving as professor of keyboard, teaching piano and organ.

She received her B.A. from Wake Forest University, her undergraduate study with Christopher Giles. Her M.Mus. is from Millikin University Conservatory of Music, Decatur, Ill. Her graduate study was with Elizabeth Travis. She also participated in a master's class in duet performance at the University of Wisconsin.

Mrs. Nicholson's additional professional experience includes teaching fellow at Millikin University for two years and piano instructor, School of Music at the University of Louisville, three years. She is a former organist-choir director at the First Presbyterian Church, Ahoskie.

Carole Nicholson holds the certificate of professional advancement in the North Carolina Music Teachers Association. She was recertified on national and state levels in Greensboro in October, 1988.

A member of the American Guild of Organists, she has given faculty recitals at Chowan, Atlantic Christian College and North Carolina Wesleyan College. She is listed in Who's Who in American Women.

She has served as adjudicator for the American College of Musicians in the Midwest and South and judge for various piano events in North Carolina.

Canadian native appointed to Department of English

Dr. Marilyn Channell-Purdy comes to Chowan after serving two years as lecturer in English at the University of Alberta, Canada. Mrs. Eakin received her B.S. degree in math education from North Carolina State University. She also was granted the M.Ed. in math education from NCSU.


