

New professors add further strength to faculty

Schaible second in family to serve on Chowan faculty

Sarah A. Schaible, a Georgia native, has been appointed to a faculty position in the Krueger School of Graphic Communications.

The new printing professor is the second member of her family to teach at Chowan College. Schaible's great aunt, Miss Valerie Maynard Schaible, served as professor of mathematics and dean of the college from 1929 to 1936. At the time of her death in December, 1936, she was filling the position of acting president.

Schaible is a graduate of Furman University with a bachelor's degree in sociology. She also holds a master's degree in industrial education with a concentration in graphic communications from Clemson University.

While a student at Clemson, Schaible was a graduate assistant in the graphic communications programs and assisted students in the various printing pre-press laboratories and the electronic pre-press department. She was named the most outstanding graduate assistant for the 1992-93 term.

She has also worked as a human resources assistant with Grace Transportation Services, a division of W. R. Grace and Company of Greenville, SC.

James Dumville to teach courses in management

James C. Dumville, of Windsor, VA, joined the faculty of the Department of Business at the beginning of the fall semester to teach courses in management.

Prior to accepting the position at Chowan, Dumville was a member of the full-time faculty at Christopher Newport University, and an adjunct professor at Paul D. Camp Community College and Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University at Langley Air Force Base. He has taught courses in Europe for the University of Maryland, City Colleges of Chicago and Central Texas College.

He received the "Faculty of the Year" award from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, European Division, in 1983, and also Christopher Newport University's Excellence in Teaching award in 1989.

Dumville received his undergraduate degree in economics at Georgetown University and a master's degree in logistics management from Air Force Institute of Technology. He is a Ph.D. candidate at Virginia Commonwealth University and expects to be awarded the doctoral degree in December.

An author of numerous articles for periodical publications, Dumville currently has three books in draft. A textbook, "Inventory: From EOQ to JIT; How To Do It, and What It Is All About", is now being reviewed by a publisher for publication later this year.

Dumville served in the U. S. Air Force with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. He is married and has a son, a graduate student at Virginia Commonwealth University, and a daughter, a junior at Maryland Institute College of Art.
