Sutton, Chowan's business manager, reveals that about 500 students have been granted loans the such this program. mitments which we have made to 85 students for the fall semester, and we will have loaned in excess of \$60,000, to these students.

The Guaranteed Student Loan Program, in which Chowan College also participates, is administered by the College Foundation, Inc., headquartered in Raleigh. Forty students are borrowing almost \$30,000 through this program to pursue their education at Chowan this fall. The State Education Assistance Authority, a new division of the Board of Higher Education of the state of North Carolina, is also working to find other resources working to find other resources of financial aid for students.
