Track Team Unbeaten In 8 Meet Season

Chowan College's 1972 track team ended its regular season with an 8-0 record which included two victories over arch rival Ferrum. The Braves also set seven new school records and

Coach Dan Surface reported that the Braves' wins also included two over Wingate and Fork Union and defeat of Elizabeth City State and Hargrave Military Academy.

In the region 10 meet April 26, Chowan placed second with 66.5 points ahead of Ferrum, Wingate and Lees-McRae. Defending champion and host Brevard won with 97 points.

Of the eight records broken by the Braves, six were by individuals and two by relay teams. Stan Lucas of Cary paced the assault with record performances in the shot (45'½'') and discus (138'9''). Another field

event mark to fall was the pole vault with Mike Ribet of Durham setting the standard at 12'8½". Don Holts of Waynesboro, Va., tied the high jump record at 6'4". Three of Chowan's school records were set in the regional meet. They included a 9.8 100-yard dash by Bobby Britt of Rocky Mount to break his own mark of 9.9 and a 16:16.8 three mile run by John Spears of Afton, Va. The third new record resulted from a 43.3 clocking by the 440 relay team comprised of Johnny Smith of Smithfield, Va., Bill Wingo of Cary, Kelvin Barnes of Richmond, Va., and Britt. The Braves captured the three events.

in the regional meet was Tom Neilson of South River, N. J., who missed a school record but set a region 10 mark in the javeline at 188'4".

Returning to spark Chowan's tennis team in the spring of 1973 will be sophomore Mike Munsey of Pearisburg, Va., the club's Most Valuable Player last year.

Named the Most Valuable


