Willie, from Mt. Vernon, N. Y., is one of the finest players Chowan has ever seen, and the title "giant" fits him like no other


Fiore Braves sparkplug for offsensive cage play

Todd McConnell is ranked second on the team with 13.4 per game, and William Brown is third with a 13.0 per game average.




