



The 1973 Chowan College Braves

Braves Top Baltimore For Conference Victory

Chowan College exploded for 16 fourth-quarter points while shutting out Baltimore Community College for a 34-26 come-from-behind victory away Sept. 15. It was the first Coastal Conference game for both teams and evened Chowan's record at 1-1. Baltimore is 0-1.

The Braves trailed through most of the game after Edward Villa received 21-yard pass from quarterback James Laze early in the first quarter for a 6-0 Baltimore lead. With seconds

remaining in the first quarter, Chowan tied the score on a 36-yard burst through the middle by fullback Ron Raysor, who shared rushing honors with running back Ronnie Mack. Raysor gained 119 yards on 14 carries and scored two touchdowns.

Baltimore scored the next two touchdowns, one on a one-yard run by Clifford Gilyard, fullback, and 55-yard pass from Laze to tight end Robert Bonneville. Laze passed for two points to Al Wilson for a 20-6 advantage with three minutes left in the half.

Chowan received the kickoff and covered 75 yards in 11 plays with split end Connie Tripp scoring the first of two touchdowns on a 36-yard pass from quarterback Pat Waguespack, playing for the injured Martin Page and guiding the team with competence. With 40 seconds left, Chowan's attempt for two points failed when the pass was incomplete and Baltimore's lead had been narrowed to 20-12, the halftime score.

Mack made it even closer for the Braves when he scampered 74 yards on the first play after an interception by back Clyde Johnson. Waguespack was tackled trying to pass to make the score, 20-18. Baltimore retaliated for its final score on the kickoff with Wilson covering 80 yards to up the Marylanders lead to 26-18 with nine minutes to go in the third period.

With the second quarter only seconds old, Chowan surged from behind to tie Baltimore on Waguespack's 33-yard pass to Tripp on the fourth play following a fumble recovery by Braves' middle linebacker Mike Yuhas at his own 46. Mack's run for the extra points tied it at 26.

A little over three minutes later Raysor provided Chowan with its winning touchdown when he bowled over defenders enroute to a 43-yard touchdown. After the kick failed, Baltimore was penalized and Head Coach Jim Garrison sent Mack through the middle for the final points. Mack produced his second 100-plus performance gaining 153 yards on 18 carries.

Defensively, Chowan made four interceptions including two by Johnson and recovered four Baltimore fumbles. Yuhas made 10 tackles and three assists and tackle Ricky Locklear added nine tackles and three assists.

Gasoline Truck Wreck Is Worse In City's History

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A gasoline tanker truck that exploded after an accident at the juncture of two major freeways caused one of the worst traffic jams in the city's history, officials said.

Authorities estimated that more than 100,000 commuters sat bumper to bumper — some up to six hours — after the accident halted traffic Friday at the interchange of the San Diego and Ventura freeways in the San Fernando Valley.

The state Highway Patrol described the scene as "nightmarish."

There were no injuries, authorities said.

Ronnie Mack Paces Braves To Win Over Potomac State

Paced by the running of tailback Ronnie Mack and a ferocious defense, Chowan College defeated Potomac State 31-14 at Keyser, W. Va., Sept. 22 in a Coastal Conference clash.

Mack scored on runs of 17 and 90 yards and the defense, playing its best game of the season, limited Potomac State to minus 32 yards rushing.

Also scoring touchdowns for the Braves were fullback Richard Holmes on a three yard run and Jack Freeman on a 58-yard punt return. Jeff Daniels

kicked two extra points and a 25 yard field goal and mack ran for two points after his 90 yard TD romp.

With Chowan leading 13-7 early in the second half, Mack bolted around left end from his own 10, broke into the clear and outran the pursuing defenders for the score.

Mack gained 151 yards on 15

carries. He has now produced 413 yards, four touchdowns, and six extra points in Chowan's first three games.

Leading Chowan in tackles with 10 was freshman end Jack Lee of LaPlata, Md., starting his first game. The defense made three interceptions and blocked a punt at Potomac's 10 yard line that led to a touchdown.

State's Wolfpack Defeats Chowan In Season Opener

Chowan College's football team opened its season by running up a 13-0 lead and in general giving the North Carolina State Jayvees a scare before bowing to the second half comeback of the Raleigh squad, 26-19, Sept. 10 in the Brave stadium.

Chowan's first score was produced by running back Ronnie Mack, returning after an absence of two years and showing he's ready to take up where he left off. With two minutes left in the first quarter, Mack ran six yards for the touchdown, set up by the fumble recovery by defensive end Mark Paschuck the play before. Jeff Daniels' kick was no good but minutes later Chowan scored again on a 39-yard pass from quarterback Martin Page to split end Connie Tripp. The two teamed up for a "picture perfect" play with Tripp receiving the spiraling pass over his shoulder in the end zone. This time, Daniels split the uprights for a Chowan advantage of 13-0.

Drives 69 Yards Following the kickoff, State

drove 69 yards with Allen White covering the final three for the score. State elected to run for two points but was thwarted by a wild lateral and Chowan's margin had been cut to 13-6, the halftime score.

Scoring wise, the second half was all State until Chowan scored its last touchdown with 1:52 remaining on a 15-yard pass from reserve quarterback Pat Waguespack to Tripp.

Waguespack replaced Page who suffered an injury to his shoulder.

State used three scores, two on runs and one on a pass, to overtake the Braves, 26-13. Quarterback Pat Connally ran five yards, back Tom McLoughlin six, and David Moody received a 13-yard pass from quarterback Caesar Campana.

Penalty Nullifies Score The score would have been closer but for a penalty that nullified a long scoring pass from Page to Tripp, who clearly established his credentials as an outstanding pass catcher. Then,

Black Oak Arkansas To Present Concert Here Monday, October 8th

"Music is our life — it's a way of getting things out, it removes frustration — and for us it's a magic carpet that can release and guide us and the audience through a lot of levels."

Speaking is Jim Mangrum, better known in friendly circles as Jim Dandy, lead singer and washboard artist supreme with Black Oak Arkansas.

That's the starboard group whose acclaimed "hot and nasty" music will be presented in concert here on Monday, October 8th at Columns Auditorium.

Music also was an escape for Jim Dandy and the five other musicians who form the Atco Records group. It took them from their hometown of Black Oak, Arkansas, population 204, away from trouble and assorted

temptations, and into a career. "Music was the common bond," Jim Dandy recalls. "Also, we had long hair before the Beatles came out. We was just country boys who didn't go to no barber, cause we just had to let the wind blow our hair."

"There was nothing special to us having long hair, but with our playing that rock 'n roll music — back then, the neighbors thought we was Communists or something."

He continues, "Jerry Lee Lewis introduced us to the ecstasy of rock, but it was Bob Dylan who made us really aware. He was the first positive influence, the first thinker."

Black Oak Arkansas progressed from local gigs to an assortment of dates in small towns throughout the country, finally arriving on the West Coast.

A few appearances, excellent word-of-mouth and a record contract began the climb to attention and popularity, aided by regular series of cross country concert appearances.

Last year, and three albums later, the group had performed its special brand of music for some 1.3 million people. A new, fourth album, "Y'All Come," is expected to help the audience count grow even higher in the year ahead.

Where will it all lead? Back to Arkansas, if the members have their way. They're determined to pour the dollars they earn into the state, buying back the land their fathers lost in the '50's.

Sharing the vision with Jim Dandy are Dirty Daugherty, bass and vocals; Burley Jett, lead guitar, banjo, piano, organ; Goober Grin Knight, lead guitar, steel guitar, piano, organ; Ricochet Reynolds, 12-string rhythm guitar; and Tommy Aldridge, drums.

Liberty Bell To Be Moved

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Liberty Bell is to be moved from Independence Hall to a site across the street to accommodate the crunch of visitors expected for the 1976 bicentennial celebration.

Mayor Frank Rizzo, who previously opposed tampering with the symbol of American liberty, made the announcement Friday after a meeting with officials from the federal and state governments.

Bicentennial planners say Independence Hall is too crowded for flocks of visitors. Rizzo said he had opposed the move because his mail ran 100-to-1 against it.

"It's always Rizzo, Rizzo, Rizzo," the mayor said exasperated. "What am I supposed to do — put it on my head?"

The city owns the bell. The state owns Independence Hall, and the federal government is responsible for the mall area around the hall.

State approval of the move is expected without difficulty.

Mariner Spacecraft Is Unveiled

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The Mariner spacecraft that is to send television pictures of Venus and Mercury to earth while enroute to a solar orbit has been unveiled at Kennedy Space Center.

The \$120 million mission will start Nov. 3 with the launch of the spacecraft on an Atlas Centaur rocket.
