If there is sufficient demand (10 or more students), I will teach a course in History 101 between the end of the semester and the beginning of summer school. Classes begin at 9:00 a.m. Monday, May 16, 1983, and continue through Friday, June 3, 1983.

Classes meet from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 Noon with a short break and from 2:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. with a short break. Classes are not held on Saturdays and Sundays. There are occasions when classes will be held at night to view filmstrips.

Expenses for the course are as follows:

\$180.00 (3 semester hours, History 101)  
 100.00\* (Room rent from May 16, 1983 to June 3, 1983)

\*Students who are required to stay on campus during the regular year are required to stay on campus if they enroll in the interim course.
