The second half started poorly and

got worst for the Braves. Forced to punt deep in their own territory, Louis Lazzaro reached down for a low snap and his knee touched at the 6 yard line. Three plays later, Marion had their first score and a 7-4 lead. Early in the 4th quarter, the Braves drove 73 yards in 4 plays to take an 11-7 lead. Behind the passing of Tim Barnes, Darrell Garrison caught a 10 yard pass. Troy Suggs hauled in a 40 yard bomb, and James Levine scored the touchdown with a beautifull 23 yard reception. The Tigers came back with an 80 yard drive in 12 plays and a 14-ll margin with 6:15 remaining in the game. It was at this point that Chowan self-destructed. After the Marion

kickoff, the Braves fumbled on the first play on their own 22 yard line. The fumble set up a Marion 34 yard field goal with 3:13 left. Another kickoff and on the first play, Chowan had a pass intercepted an returned for

a touchdown to provide the final 24-11 margin. In less than 3 minutes, a 3 point defeat had become 13.

However, after the intial loss, Coach Collin's team won three straight. Western Maryland was frist to fall as Chowan won 15-9,3-15 and 15-12. The next victim was North Carolina Wesleyan as the Rocky Mount school fell 15-5 and 15-5. The fourth game of the day saw the Lady Braves gain a measure of revenge by defeating Mary Washington 13-15, 15-8 and 15-9. The three straight wins put Chowan in a three-way tie for frist place, the tie was broken by a point spread formula which left the Braves tied for second. In a playoff, Western Maryland defeated Chowan as the Lady Braves finished in second place.
