


Hot News On Campus

Social Commission Presents System

November 1st and 2nd the Rules Committee for the Spring, Christmas, and Valentine Courts Procedures met to suggest, discuss, and ultimately to agree upon the manner in which Miss Mistletoe, the May Queen, and the Campus Sweetheart were to be elected. After much thought and careful consideration, the committee has come to the following decisions: This year for the first time the contestants for the Campus Sweetheart will be sponsored by the organized men's groups and organizations. All coeds that are regular students at Wesleyan are eligible to be in the Court. Three days before the dance the contestants will choose the Sweetheart by secret ballot vote. The vote will be based on popularity and participation. Also a contestant can represent only one club. If selected for more than one, the choice of representation will be made by the contestant. The following clubs or groups are eligible for participation: Circle K, Delta, Phi Sigma, Young Democrats, Wesleyan Players, Psychology Club, Band, Monogram Club, South Hall, Edgecombe Hall, Economics Club, The Decree, The Dissenter, Wesleyan Singers, BSU, MSM, Day Students, Council, and Young Republicans.

Clubs interested in participating should contact the Social Commission Chairman before the first of December. Second semester classes begin February 4.

Thus the clubs are strongly urged to select their representatives early in order to allow sufficient time for preparations. All clubs must submit the names of their candidates to the Social Commission no later than January 22nd.

The Campus Sweetheart's picture will appear in *The Decree*, *The Dissenter*, *The Evening Telegram*, *The News and Observer*, and her local paper. Each contestant will carry a red rose and receive a charm. The girls will wear long formals for the figures and will be escorted in the figure by the club presidents. The Campus Sweetheart will not be eligible to be the May Queen, but will be recognized as an honorary member of the May Court. The contestants will vote Wednesday night—7:30 P.M. (Feb. 10) at their first rehearsal. The contestants will be required to attend additional rehearsals; (Feb. 11 (Thursday) 4:00-5:00 and Feb. 13 (Saturday) 1:00-2:00—Mrs. J. B. Wadkins will be the pageant director.

The queen for the Semi-formal Christmas dance, Miss Mistletoe, will be chosen in the same manner as previously done. Nominations will come from the floor in Assembly December 1, and will be limited by plurality to five contestants. The polls will be open Friday—December 11 between the hours of 10:30 & 12:30. Only the Chairman of

the Election Committee, Lewis Nixon; the reigning Queen, Marylyn Shepard; the SGA President, Robert Stephens; the News Reporter; and the Court Chairman may count votes or know the identity of the Queen until 10:30 December 12.

Christmas Court pictures will appear in *The Decree*, *The Even-*

ing Telegram, *News & Observer*, and the home papers of the contestants. Flowers (not head-dresses), complimentary dance tickets, and a charm will be given to each contestant. The Queen will receive a charm, flowers, and will wear the Miss Mistletoe crown.

The members of the Court must

be available for rehearsal to be held Saturday afternoon December 12 from 1:30 to 2:30 and must meet the appointments for pictures set up at Killebrew Studio. The new Miss Mistletoe will not be eligible to hold the Campus Sweetheart Title or be the '65 May Queen. However,
