

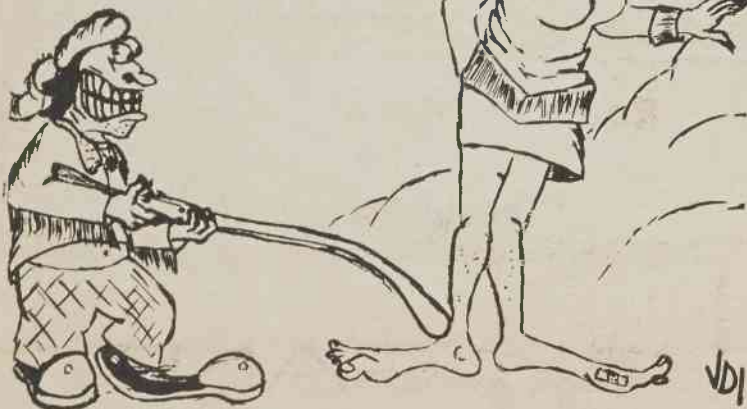
POIYTIN' AROUND

We would like to ask Matt Gaffney who won the poker game during Chapel. Seriously, nice shuffle during the prayer!

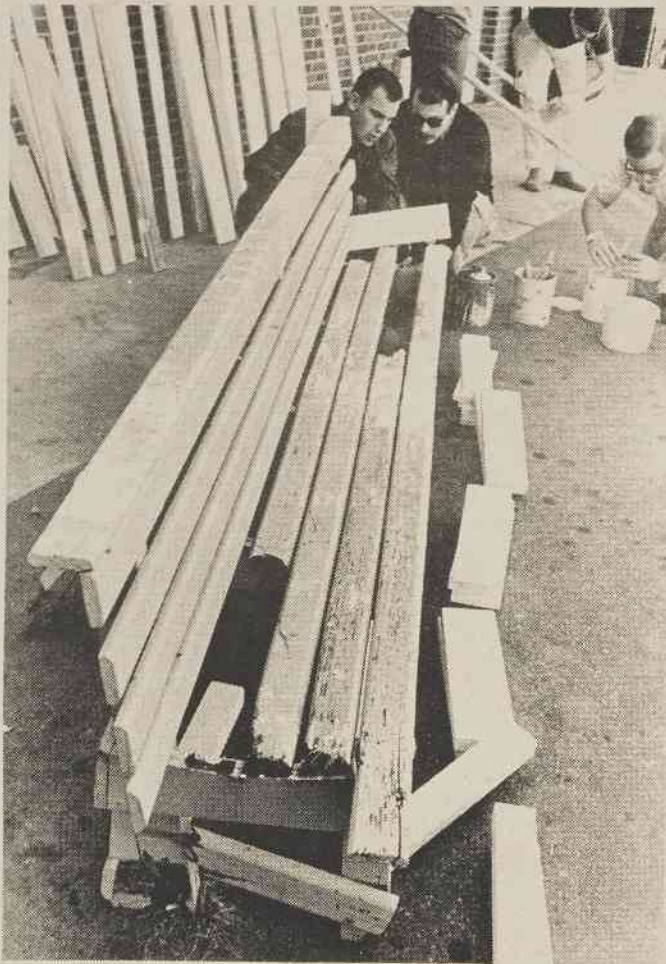

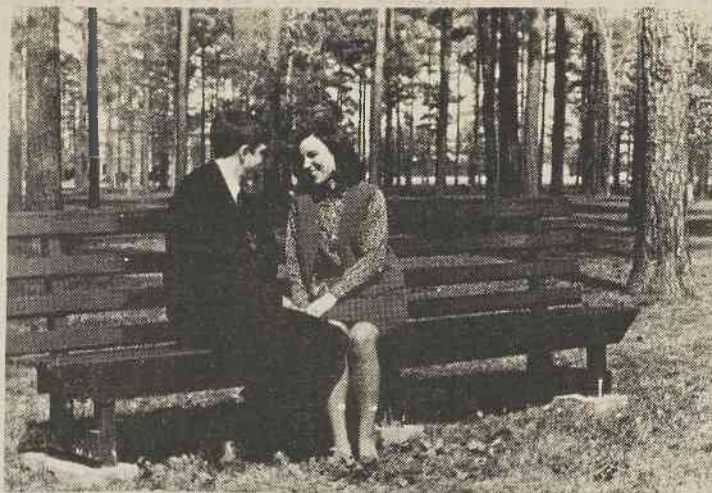
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The Omicron Rho Chapter of Alpha Phi Omega is now open for membership to all male students currently enrolled at Wesleyan.
