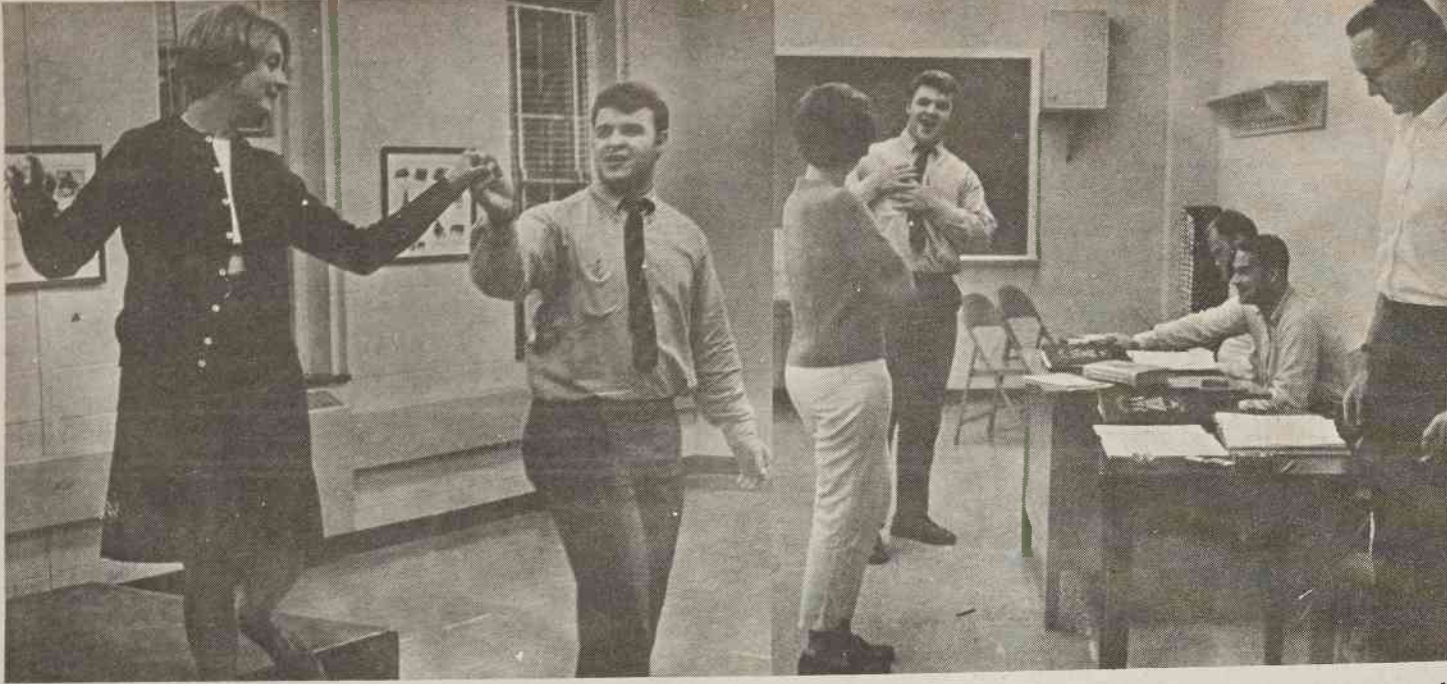


"LITTLE MARY SUNSHINE" IN REHEARSAL
