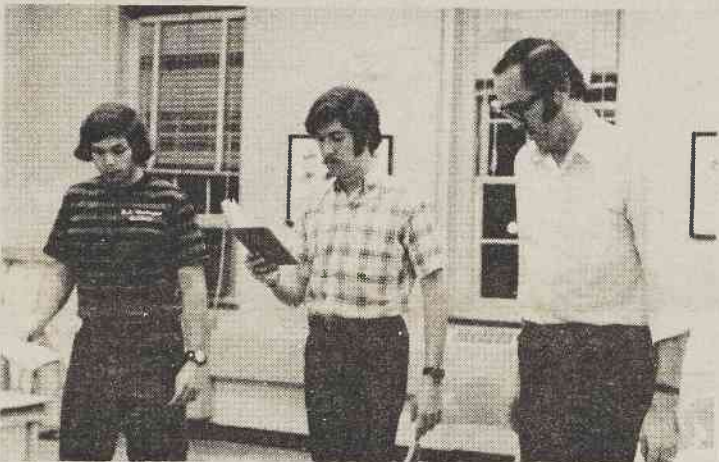

Evaluation Forms In; Tabulations Started

In accordance with the Southern Association's suggestion that students find some effective method of evaluating instruction at Wesleyan, the Senate, spearheaded by Ed Gunter, undertook a project directed toward this goal. In January, the Senate established the Subcommittee on Course and Teacher Evaluation. This subcommittee, chaired by Ed Gunter, includes Beth Speake, Doug Kozlowski, Bruce Miller, Dennis Hayek, Barbara Brown, and Bruce Wright. After studying the methods of evaluation used at various other colleges and universities, this committee decided on the Harvard form.

The forms were distributed during the week of February 15, and students were asked to complete and return the forms by Friday, March 19. The forms were then distributed to the

committee members by departments and tabulation of the results were made during the break. Each committee member was responsible for determining the average grade given to each course and each instructor, and summarizing the com-

ments and suggestions given in the open-ended section of the evaluation form. Of the 2700 forms that were printed (assuming four or five for each student), approximately 2400 were distributed. Of these

Students Recruit Over Winter Break

Students involved in the student Recruitment Program returned from winter break with reports on the progress of the program. Approximately 100 students actively recruited at high schools and churches in their home towns. No accurate figures have been devised yet, concerning the number of contacts or applicants.

Many recruiters were op-

timistic about their contacts and some reported that they had already had their contacts apply here. A number of recruiters encountered problems in their high schools because of lack of interest among the students. One girl said that her guidance counselor told her that the seniors were disinterested in college recruiters at that point because they had held college day the previous week. Some encountered problems entering the schools because of exam times and other activities.

Many recruiters spoke to juniors as well as seniors who expressed interest in advance standing and early acceptance.

The steering committee and the admissions office are now compiling figures on the number of contacts and applications received to determine credit for recruiters.

Worship Activities Planned By Interfaith

The Inter-Faith Commission in conjunction with the Faculty Religious Life Committee plans a series of worship programs for the Wesleyan community on March 9-11. On March 10, the Chamber Singers of N. C. Wesleyan will sing a Folk Mass written for them by Dr. John S. Davis. This folk mass will be presented in Garber Chapel at 7:30 p.m. On Tuesday and on Thursday evening, the Reverend John Orman, of Edenton Street United Methodist Church, Raleigh, will present two of his worship celebrations. These celebrations are modern forms, contemporary forms, of worship.

Members of the Interfaith Commission have stated that these services are to be attempts to bring a diversity to the campus religious program. All Services are planned for 7:30 p.m. in Garber Chapel.

Activists Sponsor Campus Blood Drive

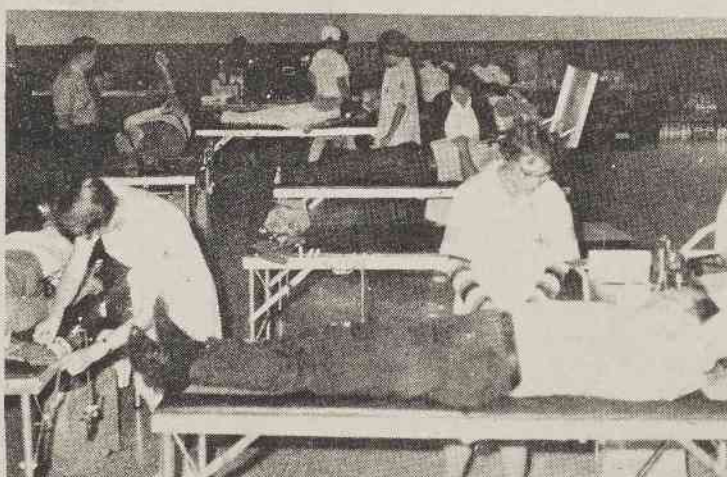
The Activists of N. C. Wesleyan College have completed plans for a blood drive sponsored by the American Red Cross. All Wesleyan students

have been urged to contribute by the Activists since Wesleyan is competing for the College Bowl Award.

This award is given to the one college in the Tidewater area that donates the most student blood to the Red Cross on a percentage basis. Some Wesleyan students have contributed in earlier city drives giving Wesleyan a 27 pint head start.

On February 16, the college was informed by the Red Cross that Congress had abolished the requirement that students under 21 must present a parental permission form. Now any person that has reached age 18 may donate his blood.

The Bloodmobile will be in Everett Gym on March 10 from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Though 80 pints have been pledged by Wesleyan students, there is a need for almost 80 more pints as our quota is 155 pints.
