

RETURNING SERVICEMEN

Following three years of service in the U. S. Marine Corps, Ray Marshall and Limuel Nance, both boarders at Plant #4, returned to work recently. Both Ray and Limuel volunteered for three years of military duty with the Marine Corps on March 3, 1953, taking their three months basic training at Parris Island Marine Base, S. C. Next, they were transferred to Camp Pendleton, California for an advanced infantry course.

Until their overseas assignment, Ray was with the 1st Combat Group, 3rd Marine Division, and Limuel was with the Weapons Company, 1st Battallion, 9th Marine Regiment, 3rd Marine Division. Upon their arrival in Japan, Ray served with the Ordnance Service Company, 3rd Service Regiment, 3rd Marine Marine Division, while Limuel went with his unit to Japan.

Ribbon, United Nations Service Ribbon, Presidential Unit Citation Ribbon, National Defense Service Ribbon and the Korean Service Ribbon. Ray was separated as a corporal and Limuel as a sergeant.

Ray returned to work March 9, and Limuel returned March 8. Both boys are single and live with their parents in Kernersville.

Harold Dean Matthews, boarder at Plant #1, returned to work on April 3, 1956, after serving two years in the U. S. Army.
