ETHEL FITTS RETIRES WITH THIRTY-NINE YEARS

On January 14, 1966, Ethel E. Fitts, timekeeper in the Finishing Department of Plant #1, punched her time card for the last time. After more than thirty-nine years of continuous service with Adams-Millis Corporation, she began a well-deserved retirement.
