tions or their volunteer work with the United Way campaign."

At the Adams-Millis Administrative office, employees increased their pledges by more than 58 percent over 1990, according to Linda Leach, who was campaign coordinator.

Employees there contributed \$22,268, compared to \$12,963 in 1990. The 1991 goal was set at \$18,000 and contributions exceeded the goal by 24 percent.

"I want to thank everyone for everything they did to make this campaign such a success," Leach said. "Everyone was so cooperative and helpful in every way possible."

At a victory celebration, several employees won a variety of prizes through a drawing. Winning Sara Lee product baskets were Sandra Green, Lu Rogers, Jerry Durham and Robin Korinck.

In Kernersville, Adams-Millis employees contributed more than \$47,000 to the 1991 United Way of Forsyth County Campaign, exceeding their 1990 total by 36 percent.

"What these folks did is incredible in view of the current economic situation," said Don Dwiggins, campaign division director for the United Way. "What they have done speaks volumes. With what they have done it certainly sets the pace for what could be the most successful United Way campaign ever in Kernersville. If that is the case, it certainly will be due in large part to what Adams-Millis employees have shown through their contributions."

Contributions from employees in the Kernersville Finishing Plant totaled \$32,545.36 while Kernersville Knitting employees contributed \$14,941.28 in the pacesetting effort for a total of \$47,486.64.

The contributions will help to fund 52 member-agencies in Forsyth County.

"This campaign really goes back to the people at Adams-Millis," Dwiggins added. "They really care about people. There was no pressure from management for contributions. They just gave it of their own free will."
