(Continued from Page 3) Not once have I read or heard that any of our so-called outstanding Negro collegiate institutions included in their lyceum series one jazz group. This failure of our Negro colleges to sense and share in the trend recognized by others leads one to wonder just who is leaving, whom behind. Jazz, after all, is largely a contribution of Negro musicians.

In reading an article about college sponsored jazz programs in the August 1957 issue of Jazz Today, I found that Brandeis University of Waltham, Mass., sponsored a classical-progressive jazz program. The modern jazz artist played some classical music and was given points on how the classical artist develops his type of music, and the classical artist in turn followed this procedure.

Both groups found out something about each other's type of music, thus, imparting warmth and understanding for their particular field of musical endeavor. The concert proved to be a great success, proving even to those who oppose such programs that there is a great deal of worth in the new musical art form, progressive jazz.

*"Funky", a new word coined by Eastcoast modern jazzmen, means swinging.




