They visited research institutions, hospitals, and medical schools in Moscow, Rostov-on-Don, and Leningrad.

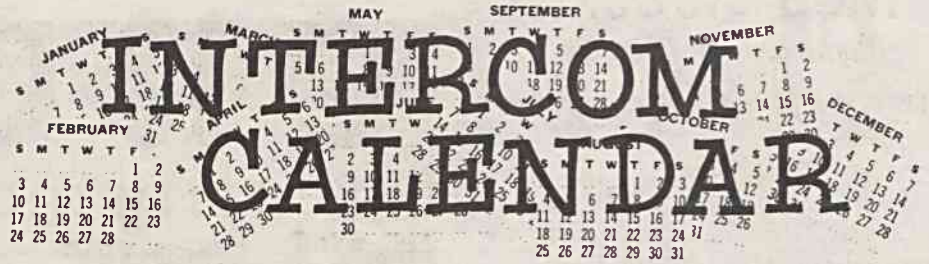
