
# Smith Returns from South; Looks to North


S. Douglas Smith, who held administrative positions at the medical center from 1966-71, has returned to Duke Hospital as an associate administrative director.

In announcing the appointment, Administrative Director Richard Peck said Smith's primary assignments over the next two years will involve pre-operational activities of Duke Hospital North, scheduled for occupancy in the spring of 1979.

For the past four and a half years, Smith has been associated with Humana, Inc., and during most of that time was Southwest regional manager in Dallas with responsibility for operation of eight general acute care hospitals in Texas.

Prior to that, in 1971 and 1972, he was associate administrator of Greenville (S.C.) General Hospital.

**Symposium Topics To Include** 

Current concepts on use of the pill and new advances in obstetrics are among the topics of the 13th annual E.C. Hamblen Symposium beginning here this morning in the Hospital Amphitheater.

The symposium on reproductive biology and family planning is named for the man who founded Duke's interdepartmental Division of Endocrinology, Dr. Edwin C. Hamblen. He died in 1963.

Today's first morning session is "Physiology of Menopause and the Later Years," by one of the two guest faculty members, Dr. Edward E. Wallach, professor of obstetrics-gynecology at the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. R. Herbert Wiebe of the Duke faculty will then discuss "Therapy of Menopause."

Two Duke physicians will

conclude the morning session with Dr. William T. Creasman discussing "Natural History and Pathology of Adenocarcinoma of the Endometrium" and Dr. Charles B. Hammond talking on "Estrogen Therapy and Endometrial Cancer.'

Two films of symposiums, "The Normal Healthy Woman" and "The Woman at Risk," both dealing with current concepts in oral contraceptive treatment, will be shown and discussed this afternoon.

At Saturday morning's Newer Advances in Obstetrics session, the second guest faculty member, Dr. Roy M. Pitkin, professor of Ob-Gyn at the University of Iowa, will talk on "Nutrition During Pregnancy." Later in the morning he will discuss "Autoimmune Diseases in

Other Saturday morning speakers, from the Duke faculty, will be Dr. Jane E. Brazy, "Perinatal Aspects of Beta Strep Infection," and Dr. Stanley A. Gall, "Current Management of Rh Sensitization."
