

## Six Faculty Members Appointed

The appointments of six medical center faculty members have been announced by University Provost Frederic N. Cleaveland.

Drs. Albert D. Loro Jr. and Robert H. Shipley have been named assistant professors of medical psychology in the Department of Psychiatry. Loro also has been appointed assistant professor of community health sciences.

Dr. David F. Mertens has become associate professor of radiology and assistant professor of pediatrics.

Also receiving assistant professorship appointments are Drs. Steven J. Gross, pediatrics; Emma R. Jakoi, anatomy; and George Michalopoulos, pathology.

A native of Chicago, Loro earned a B.S. degree from Purdue University, Lafayette, Ind., in 1971 and a Ph.D. from Washington University, St. Louis, in 1976. He is a staff psychologist for Duke's Dietary Rehabilitation Clinic.

Shipley is from Michigan, and received a B.S. from Michigan State University in 1967. He holds M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Iowa, granted in 1970 and 1972 respectively.

Mertens is a 1952 graduate of the University of Cincinnati and earned an M.D. there in 1956. The Cincinnati native served in the U.S. Air Force 1959-1971 as chief of pediatrics, March Air Force Base, Riverside, Calif.

Gross received his B.S. and M.D.

degrees from the University of Maryland in 1969 and 1973 respectively. He is a native of Washington, D.C.

A 1968 graduate of Washington State University, Jakoi earned her Ph.D. at Duke in 1973 and has been a staff researcher here since that date. She was born in Canada and became a United States citizen in 1955.

Michalopoulos is from Samos, Greece. He graduated summa cum laude from Athens University Medical School in 1969, and completed his internship and residency at the University of Wisconsin Medical School.

## Original Teacher Here for Reunion


(Continued from page 1) recommendation that was more than statewide."
