Students Will Register March 7 For Spring Quarter Classes

Registration for all students, other than those who have been authorized to complete early registration, will be on Tuesday, March 7, 1967. The registration will be held in the college gymnasium from 9:00-12:00 and 1:00-4:00. Evening registration will be from 7:15-8:45.

The procedure for registration for students who register at this time will be to pick up their course authorization card from their adviser and then report to the gymnasium where they will be processed for registration in the usual procedure--completing class cards, curriculum data card and payment of fees.

STUDENTS ARE EXPECTED TO BRING THEIR WINTER QUARTER GRADES WITH THEM FOR DISCUSSION WHEN THEY MEET WITH THEIR ADVISER.

Early registration will be provided for two groups of students.

A. Graduating Sophomores - Graduating sophomores will receive a form letter giving them an assigned time to come by the Student Personnel Services Office to complete class cards and curriculum data cards (this includes selection of class hours) so that they may pay their fees

and have completed registration early. For these sophomore students no attendance at the regular registration will be necessary since they will have completed the registration procedure early!

B. Vocational Students - Vocational students will be completely pre-registered at meetings held with them. This is possible since they have a fixed curriculum to follow. The only arrangement the Vocational students will have to make is for the payment of fees and this can be done prior to the registration day.

Salem College Chorus To Present Concert In Whiteville February 24

The Salem College Choral Ensemble of Winston Salem will present a concert at the Whiteville High School Auditorium Friday, February 24, at 8 p.m.

The all-girl chorus of forty-six voices under the direction of Paul Peterson will feature a group of sacred songs of various periods and styles, German songs by Schubert and Brahms, and a group of modern songs by American composers. Also to be performed is a Bach toccato sung traditionally by the Chorus.

Miss Harriet Haywood, former accompanist for the Choral Ensemble and now a teacher at

Whiteville High School, will be guest accompanist for the toccato.

ARCHWAYS WILL SING

The Archways, composed of seven of the Ensemble members, will present several popular numbers. The group has been featured throughout the Winston Salem area and has sung for various clubs and conventions. Also in the area of popular music will be Misses Deedre Garritz and Susan Gray Fowler performing a folk medley using Spanish, English, and American folk tunes.

Miss Fowler, a sophomore at Salem and a native of Whiteville, will also perform Schumann's Papillons Opus 2 on the piano.

CHORUS TRAVELS WIDELY

The Choral Ensemble has made two concert tours to Europe, has appeared on CBS television, several NBC radio programs, and has made tours of several areas in the Eastern half of the United

States. The Chorus is scheduled to appear with the Winston Salem Symphony on March 14.
