SCC President Will Be Inaugurated October 13

Ceremonies of major significance in the young history of Southeastern Community College take place October 13, at 2 p.m., with the official dedication of the new campus, and the inauguration of E. Phillip Comer as president.

The special occasion will be open to the public, and will include invited guests representing the fields of education, business, and industry, along with the county and college officials, and representatives of the faculty and student body. Dr. Robert K. Gustafson, dean of the college, and William Eddins, business manager, are co-chairman of the ceremonies.

Archie K. Davis, chairman of the board of directors of the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company, and former state senator from Forsyth County, will be the main speaker.

Dr. I. E. Ready, director of the Department of Community Colleges of the State Board of Higher Education, also will take part in the program.

Although Comer assumed the presidency of Southeastern

Community College in June, 1967, and the new campus of four buildings opened for students in September, 1967, formal inauguration and dedication ceremonies were not

scheduled until officials chose Oct. 13 date as the most appropriate.

Among the specially invited guests who will extend greetings are L. G. Bliss, president of the Foote Mineral Co., of Philadelphia on behalf of industry.

James Clifton will extend greetings on behalf of the faculty at SCC, and Miss Pat Clark, president of the Student Government Association, will extend greetings on behalf of the students.

Also participating will be Henry B. Wyche, chairman of the college's board of trustees, giving the charge on the occasion of the investiture of the president. He will also take part in that portion of the program in which the buildings are officially accepted.

W. O. Johnson, chairman of the Columbus County commissioners, also will take part in the ceremonies.

College officials also are arranging a reception to be held immediately following the inauguration and dedication ceremonies.

Mr. Marion Martin, advisor of the Fine Arts Committee, has affirmed the concert series schedule for this school year. Mrs. Mary Godwin, Shakespearian actress, will begin the series of four concerts on October 16 at 8:15 in the college auditorium.

Mary Godwin will present a recital in costume of "Favourite Women From Shakespeare." The characters of Portia, Lady Macbeth, and Rosalind are among these.

Mrs. Godwin was co-founder of Canada's first Shakespeare Festival and for the past 10 years has played most of the great leading roles in Shakespeare's plays. She has proved that she is as successful in the comedies as in the tragedies.

Critics acclaim, "Mary Godwin has a perennial type of beauty and grand stage presence which commands that you rivet your attention upon her. She held her spell over the audience and carried her scenes with a fine pace and gaiety."

Agreement Still Valid

Students planning to transfer to Pembroke must not deviate from the transfer agreement on page 31 in the college catalogue.

Transcripts that do not comply with the agreement will be evaluated on a course by course basis and the student's D's will not transfer.

If the students abide exactly by the agreement, as stated in the catalogue, they will be accorded Junior status by Pembroke.
