### CHRISTIANS PLAY ERSKINE TODAY; HIGH POINT NEXT

An excellent chance to run up victory number three of the current season faces Elon's footballers when they play Erskine College of Due West, S. C. at Anderson, S. C., tonight. The game should prove a welcome relief after their meeting in losses to two powerhouses the last two weeks—Catawba and Newberry. Erskine's outfit, coached by Hen Bolick, is one of the few non-winning teams in the country and has had a record number of points scored against it, having bowed to Davidson, 70-0; Lenoir-Rhyne, 26-0; Presbyterian, 47-0; E. C. T. C. (beaten by Elon), 21-0; and last Saturday, to a coasting Appalachian squad. It is doubtful if Erskine will get into the win column against the re-bounding Christians.

The following week all Elon students will make the trip to Greensboro as Elon meets the strong Purple of High Point at Memorial stadium. Coach Perry's men will be up for this one, for after last year's basketball ruckus, this is the game the Christians want most. Perry's lads will have to be tough, for High Point gave Appalachian a whale of a battle before going down, 10-6. High Point was also defeated by Catawba, 19-7 and tied by Western Carolina, 6-6. The Panthers hold victories over Milligan, 19-7, and Lenoir-Rhyne, 33-0. Last week High Point grabbed a lucky one from Newberry, 12-6, in the last seconds of the game. Elon gave Newberry a fairly good game and might surprise at Greensboro.

### FIRST BASKETBALL PRACTICE NOV. 11

The first official basketball practice will be held on Monday, November 11, in the college gym, it has been announced by Coach L. J. Perry. This year Elon expects to have a strong team, with a nucleus of lettermen around which to build. If indications hold true, the Christian cagers may be the team to beat in the scramble for the North State conference title, and hopes are high of surpassing the 1945-46 season record of 17 wins and eight losses.

"Too little and too light," was the story last Saturday when the Elon football team ran into the Indians of Catawba College in a North State conference grid battle at beautiful Bowman Gray stadium, Winston-Salem. Catawba, "too much and too hefty," rolled over the gallant but out-classed Christians, 40-0, to inflict the third loss of the year on the Perry eleven, which had a two-two record before the opening whistle.

Elon started off as if it might give the powerful Catawbans a close fight, Bobby Harris ripping off a first down on the first two running plays of the game; but it didn't take long for the Indians to reverse things. Beginning on their own 38-yard line, late in the quarter, Catawba went all the way, with Bowen, Spaecht, and Georgiana plowing for big gains. Georgiana finally plunged over for the score from the half-yard marker. Dorton's conversion made it 7-0 at the quarter.

Shortly after the next period got underway, another sustained march, this time from their own 33, resulted in the second touchdown, which came on a 24-yard pass from Bowen to Spaecht. Dorton again converted. No sooner had Elon received the kickoff and been penalized to their own two-yard line than Catawba had another score. Gardner, a lineman, intercepted a desperate end-zone pass and stepped two yards to tally. Halftime score, after Dorton's third placement, was 21-0.

Elon didn't even get to touch the ball after the second-half kickoff, before the Indians scored again. Taking possession on the 15, Catawba rolled 85 yards in twelve plays, Georgiana getting his second six-pointer, of the night on a plunge from the one.

Interference on a pass set up another third-period counter for Catawba, when the officials ruled Bowen had been bumped on the two-yard line. Bowen then made the touchdown on an end sweep.

The last tally of the game came early in the final quarter when Hunter raced five yards through the Elon line. Dorton's kick was good. A few minutes later Elon made its only threat, as Bud Ferneyhough and Jim Murray sparked a drive to the enemy 21; but there Catawba held.

## Elon Gridders Defeated, 20-0, By Newberry

Crippled, and suffering from a bad attack of the fumbles, Elon's Fighting Christians went down before Newberry's hostile Indian tribe, 20-0, on October 18, in a non-conference football game at Newberry, S. C. Two Elon fumbles resulted in touchdowns for the enemy, and another led to the third Indian score, as the Christians fought a losing battle without their two star tailbacks, Dave McClenny and Bob Harris.

Elon's only moment of glory during the game was Bobby Hogan's 57-yard punt return for a touchdown, which was nullified because of a penalty on the play.

Newberry went ahead in the first period when Elon fullback Bud Ferneyhough was unable to get off a punt and fumbled as he was hit in the end zone. Schofield recovered for Newberry, and the Indians were in front at the end of the quarter, 7-0.

The second touchdown, a 45-yard march in the second period, followed another Christian fumble. This time, Moore smashed over, making the half-time score 13-0.

The final scoring play came in the third quarter, when Bob Corley, Newberry center, grabbed Hogan's fumble out of mid-air and ran 18 yards for a touchdown. Lynch kicked the extra point after the first and third markers.
