Finishes Second

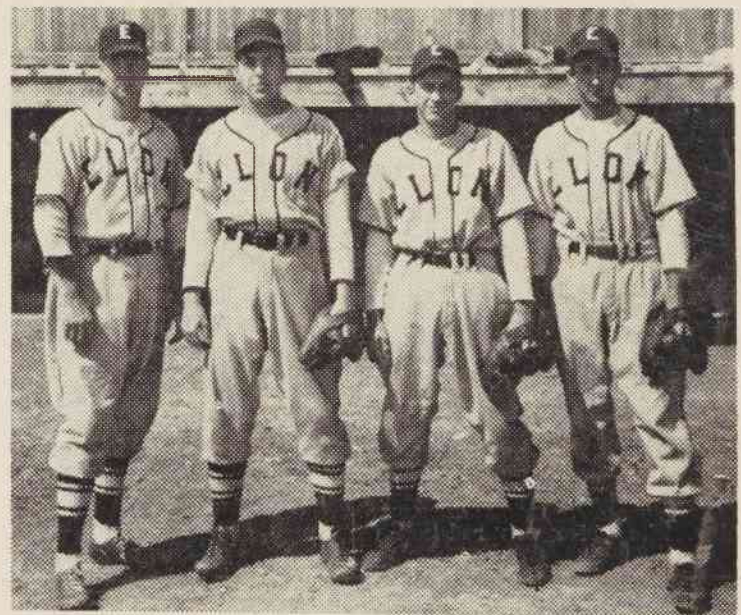
For the second straight year, the Elon netters finished in second place behind the repeating North State champions, High Point. The local racquet swingers completed their season with a record of eight wins and three losses.
