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Russian And **Atom Classes For Adults**

A course in the Russian language and instruction in regard to the atomic bomb and effective civilian defense will be features of the fifth series of adult night classes, which will get underway here a Elan on Tuesday evening. February 13th.

This was revealed inst weekend by Dr. W. W. Sloan, chainman o the faculty commune on adult , announced the eui time schedule for the new night classes. The schedule has been spread over a period of four nights each week, thus providing a better opportunity for students to fit the instruction into their personal schedules.

In announcing the new schedule, Dr. Sloan pointed out that the night courses had previously been concentrated largely on Tuesday and Thursday nights. The new schedule calls for at least one class on each night from Tuesday through Friday for a period of twelve weeks.

All classes meet in Alamance Building, beginning at 7 o'clock and lasting until 10 o'clock each evening. Each of the courses offer either college graduation or teacher certificate credit. Wives of the students are especially urged to take advantage of the instruction, and a special tuition rate has been provided for them.

The new course on the atom bomb and civilian defense will be taught by members of the Elon science faculty, with the cooperation of officials of the North Carolina civilian defense program. It will be given on Tuesday nights, along with a course ir the psychology of adolescence, by Prof. Gilbert Latham.

The class in spoken Russian will be taught by Dr. Konstantinas Avizonis and is scheduled for Wednesday nights. The Thursday night classes include a course in Shakespeare by Dr. James Howell and a class in the history of education by Prof. J. C. Cooley. Dr W. W. Sloan will offer a course in the New Testament on Friday nights each week.


