

Dave Maddox Maintains Lead In Varsity Scoring

Dave Maddox, who really got hot on his foul shooting up at Western Carolina last Saturday night, continued this week to lead the Fighting Christians in individual scoring. The figures are based upon games through last week, which ends with the Christians still all even with eight wins and eight losses after sixteen games.

Knotted with Western Carolina for third place in the Conference standings with 6-4 records, the Christians again honored their team scoring slightly to 69.8 points per game, but the defenses slipped in the last two weeks and allowed the opposition to climb back to an average of 73.3 points per game.

Maddox, who maintained his position at the top of the scoring column, has registered 240 points in 16 games, having hit 82 field goals and 76 free throws. This gives the big Christian center a personal average of exactly 15 points per game, a gain of more than one point per game within one week's time. He hit 14 of 16 free throws against Western Carolina.

Four others on the Christian roster are now over the century mark in individual scoring. Bobby Timmons trails Maddox with 135 points, while Jack Mitchell has 124 points, Don Packard 119 points and Ned Gauldin 112 points. Jack Malloy, Roy Kieval and Ray Whitley are all within striking distance of the 100-point mark.

No less than 18 different boys have broken into the scoring column for the Christians at one time or another this season, although a couple of the group are no longer listed with the varsity squad. The individual scoring, figured through the Western Carolina game at Cullowhee last Saturday night, is as follows:

Our campus is loaded with "pro" baseball talent, both active and inactive. Bobby Jones, Boston Red Sox rookie, will report to Ocala, Fla., for spring training and may hook on with Greensboro. Bobby Stewart has signed with the Detroit Tigers and has not yet been assigned. Jimmy Dalton, signed with the Baltimore Orioles, played last year in the Tri-State league. Jack McKeon, Fred Biangardi and Billy Cayavec have all signed the dotted line with the Bur-Gra Pirates, affiliate of the Pittsburgh Pirates. Jack Mitchell has signed with Shreveport and will train with that club. Alex Morrow is back with the Washington Senators' organization for the third straight year. John Brady, a big right-hander, will go to Phoenix, Ariz., with the parent Giant club for spring training. Nel Cooper, now coaching Elon High School, is set to go with High Point in the Carolina League. I will keep in touch with each of these boys and pass on the news of their progress.

Coach Sid Varney and some able assistants, among whom is Dwight Dillon, last year's co-captain, are well pleased with the off-

season showing of some thirty Christians, now participating in Winter practice. Most of the boys are from last fall's squad, with next year's freshmen not due to report until fall. Winter practice has been hampered somewhat, by inclement weather, but Coach Varney got in no winter practice at all last year with his first Elon squad.

Aside from last year's leading ground-gainer, John Platt, the entire Christian backfield will return for 1954 duty. In the quarterback slot is Bill Snyder and Jerry Akromas, and fullbacks Revell Morrison and Glenn Beal are looking good. Whitney Bradham, Kerry Richards, Eddie Bridges and Paul Watts are among the halfbacks.

Homer Hobgood has been especially busy at center, with Bob Kopko still nursing an injured knee. Guards include lettermen Chuck Maynard, Joe Smith and Glenn Varney, with Nick Theos likely to alternate between tackle and guard. Tackles in action include J. C. Disher, Jim Hawkins and Pat Cafasso from last fall's outfit, reinforced by Eddie Davidson, who becomes eligible for action next September. Veteran Joe Widdifield is still recuperating from a knee operation. Returning ends include Mal Bennett, Archie Wilborn and Bubba Barnes.

Plans Discussed For Spring Dance

The price of stag tickets for the winter dance, a request for a record player and consideration of a dance committee for the spring formal took the spotlight at the student legislative meeting on February 4th.

The legislature, realizing that the purpose of the dance was not to make money, passed a motion lowering the price of stag tickets from the previously specified \$1.50 to 75 cents each.

Diane Maddox, chairman of the entertainment committee, requested the legislature to appropriate money for a record player for student use. The matter was deferred until financial returns from the winter dance were known before action was submitted to the legislature by the student body president, but it was rejected after a heated discussion, and a new list of names was sent back to the president for his approval.

The legislators expressed surprise to learn that changes in the student constitution, voted in by the students sometime ago, had not yet taken effect because they had not yet been submitted to the board of trustees.
