A charity throw by Captain Gilbert Watts with barely five seconds on the clock gave the Fighting Christian cagers a spine-tingling 69 to 68 victory over the Pfeiffer Panthers in Alumni Memorial Gymnasium here on Monday night, February 2nd.

It was Elon's second victory over Pfeiffer this season, for the Christians had won a pre-Christmas battle on the Panther floor by an 33 to 77 count, but this second win did not come without a bitter battle.

The lead and scoring drives alternated during the fray so that Elon apparently lost the tussle, then won it and lost again and then made the win final on Captain Watts' perfect free throw.
