Bears Down Elon, In Last Home Battle

The Fighting Christian cagers losed out their home basketba chedule on Thursday night. Feeruary 19th, when they absorbed a 58 to 50 defeat at the hands of the powerful Bears of Lenoir Rhyne, but the Elon basketeers put up a stiff fight and made the game a nip-and-tuck affair until the closing moments.

The score was tied seven times in the first half, with the Christians rebounding from a slow start to knot the score at 13-all after eleven minutes were gone. The Elon outfit pulled out to a fourpoint lead and went on to hold a 31 to 29 advantage when the rivals went to the dressing rooms for the half.

The contest continued close through the third quarter of the game, with the score knotted at 45-45 after eleven minutes of the final half, but Elon hit a cold streak at that point and did not score for about six minutes. By that time the Bears were out front by a 54-45 count, and they held he lead to the end.

Once more big Tony Carcaterra was the top point-getter for the Christians as he hit for 13 points, and he also pulled down 17 rebounds during the fray. leaders for Elon were Eddie Burke and Marsh Oakley, each of whom counted five field goals for 10 points. 

Big Tony Carcaterra, Elon's on! three-sport athlete, who has a ready won All-Conference and All State honors in football and base ball, posted a strong bid for Conference honors in basketball a. he led the Christian cagers it scoring with 267 points for the full 22-game regular season.

Carcaterra also had the top floor-shooting average with 44. per cent on 97 of 219 attempts, top free throw average of 68.9 per cent on 73 of 186, the most field goals, the most free throws and pulled down the most rebounds. In fact, his 308 rebounds, for an average of 14 per game, was tops in the entire Conference.

Only bracket in which the big Long Island boy failed to lead the parade was in average points per game, a field in which Eddie Burke was the leader with 254 in 19 games for an average of 13.4 points per game. Carcaterra aver aged 12.7 points per game.


As Safe Driver




