## Christian '5' Topples Apps In Tilt Here

Hitting a sensational 67 per cent of their floor shots in the second half, the Elon Christians broke a tight Carolinas Conference game wide open and went on to defeat the Appalachian Mountaineers 78 to 51 here on Monday night, January 8th.

The Mountaineers, showing surprising strength, led through much of the first half before Elon came to life and moved out front in the final three minutes of the half, leading at intermission by a 38-21 margin. Elon the outscored the Apps 40 to 22 in the final half as the Christians hit 18 of 27 floor shots.

Big Dewey Andrew led the attack for Elon with 27 points, but he had plenty of help from Jesse Branson with 13, Gary Teague with 12 and Dave Winfrey with 10 counters. Branson also excelled in his specialty as he grabbed down 19 rebounds. The leader for the Mountaineers was Wayne Duncan, only visitor in double figures, who hit for 21 points.

Moving out to a long lead in the first half, the Fighting Christians cagers rolled for an 83 to 57 triumph over the Guilford Quakers on the Elon floor on Monday night, December 11th, in the final home game prior to Christmas holidays.

Jesse Branson, proving early in the season that he would be a force to reckon with in Conference cage play, paced the Elon attack as he poured in 26 points and pulled down 19 rebounds in a fine backboard exhibition.

Three other Christians hit double figures, with Dewey Andrew racking 14 and with Gary Teague and Bill Morningstar each hitting 13 points for the night. Teague and Morningstar also contributed some outstanding bits of floor play during the battle. Mike Allred had 13 and Dan Kuzma had 11 points to lead Guilford.

The East Carolina Pirates eked out a 67 to 65 victory over the Elon Christians at Greenville on Saturday night, January 6th handing the Elon cagers their first defeat in Carolinas Conference competition in a bitterly fought battle that remained close until the end.

Taking advantage of erratic play by the Christians in the early part of the game, the Pirates moved out to a 36 to 27 lead at half-time, but Elon came back strong to outscore the East Carolina outfit by seven points in the closing half.

Charlie Lewis, whose sharpshooting in the final half proved deadly, chipped in 25 points to pace the Pirates, and he was joined in double figures by Bill Otte with 15 and Richie Williams with 11 counters.

The Christians, who hit 26 field goals in 57 tries for a 45.6 per cent, outscored the Pirates from the floor, but East Carolina had thirty foul shots and made good on twenty-five of them to chalk the victory.

## Christians Finish Second In Fort Lee Cage Meet

The Fighting Christians cagers grabbed the spotlight as one of the top small-college cagers in the South when they advanced to the finals of the annual Fort Lee Holiday Tournament before losing to the pro-laden Fort Lee Travellers in the titular finals by a score of 76 to 56.

Moving into a tournament which opened on December 14th with four unbeaten teams, the Christians proved themselves a top contender when they turned back Hampden-Sidney's Tigers 81 to 70 on the opening night, and they continued the hot pace by defeating Randolph Macon 81 to 60 in the second night of play on December 15th.

Dewey Andrew bucketed 29 points to lead the Elon quint to victory over Hampden-Sidney in the opener, tying Bill Hardin of the Tigers for individual scoring honors for the first night of tournament play. The Christians were down by two points at 70-68 with three minutes left, but they rolled for thirteen points while holding Hampden-Sidney scoreless in the final moments.

The Christians were just as hot on the next night as they defeated the Randolph-Macon outfit 81 to 60 to move into the final against Fort Lee, with Elon putting five men in double figures in an offensive which overcame a fouling epidemic that sent three Christians to the sidelines during the fray.

Once more Dewey Andrew, big Christian pivot star, was top scorer with 22 points, but he suffered an ankle injury during the battle and was lost to the team for the next night. Other Elon players in double figures against Randolph Macon were Gary Teague with 16, Arthur Davis with 13, Bill Morningstar with 11 and Sonny Smith with 10 counters.

Lenny Wilkins, a former scoring ace for the St. Louis Hawks in the National Basketball League, led the attack for Fort Lee in the tournament finals, bucketing 22 points as the Travellers defeated Elon 76 to 65. Top scorer for Elon was Jesse Branson, freshman forward, who hit 16 points and pulled down as many rebounds.
