

# New Attendance Rules Announced For Campus

New attendance regulations for all Elon students were adopted last spring and went into effect for the first time with the opening of the fall semester this year. The full text of the new rules are presented below:

(1) **Day classes in fall and spring semesters:** A student who is not on academic probation is allowed in each course the number of excused absences which is equivalent to the number of class meetings per week in that course. For each unexcused absence in excess of this ratio the student will be liable to the loss of one semester hour credit. Necessary absences must be explained in writing (see paragraphs 8, 9 and 10).

(2) **Evening classes in fall, spring and summer sessions and day classes in summer sessions:** A student who is not on academic probation is allowed two unexcused absences in each course. For each additional unexcused absence the student will be liable to the loss of one semester hour credit. Necessary absences must be explained in writing (see paragraphs 8, 9 and 10).

(3) A student on academic probation is allowed no unexcused absences and is liable to the loss of semester hour credit on the following basis: one semester hour credit will be deducted for every unexcused absence.

(4) A student whose unexcused absences become so excessive during a semester that he would lose the entire credit for any 3 or 4 semester hour course is liable to immediate suspension from school or suspension from the course with a grade of WF, subject to the discretion of the Absence Subcommittee of the Administrative Committee. Suspension from school will be for one regular semester in addition to the remainder of the semester in addition to the remainder of the semester during which the penalty is incurred.

(5) A student who has taken at least 24 semester hours of work at Elon College with a cumulative

average of 3.67 or above is allowed unlimited unexcused absences.

(6) Absences are counted from the first meeting of the class. Those who enter a course late are reported as absent from previous meetings.

(7) Three tardies are counted as one class absence.

(8) An absence appeal form must be filled out, attached to the written verification for the absence, and submitted to the Office of the Registrar within one week after the absence or return to class. An absence appeal form submitted later than one week after the student's return to class will not be considered.

(9) Absences caused by illness may be excused if the student presents written verification from the school nurse or from the attending physician.

(10) Absences incurred while the student is officially representing the College may be excused if written verification is provided.

(11) Cases involving unusual circumstances are viewed by the entire membership of the Administrative Committee.

## Chapel Program Change Made For New Session

The daily chapel programs for the Elon College students are being conducted this year under a changed schedule, according to an announcement from Dr. J. E. Danjeley, president of the college.

Under the new schedule there will be only one day of compulsory chapel attendance each week for Elon students this year, with the freshmen required to attend on Thursday mornings and the upperclassmen required to attend on Friday mornings. A third program on Tuesday mornings will be subject only to voluntary attendance by students of all class groups.

The regular chapel period from 10 until 10:30 o'clock each Monday and Wednesday mornings will be devoted to meetings of various student organizations, including as part of each student's total education the various classes and club groups.

Prof. John Graves, who also serves as college chaplain, will be in charge of the Tuesday and Thursday programs, which will continue to be of a religious type. Dr. Ferris Reynolds will have charge of the Friday programs for upperclassmen, who is working with a committee of both faculty and students an effort to plan which will prove to be a significant part of each student's total educational experience.

## College Receives Large Cash Gift
