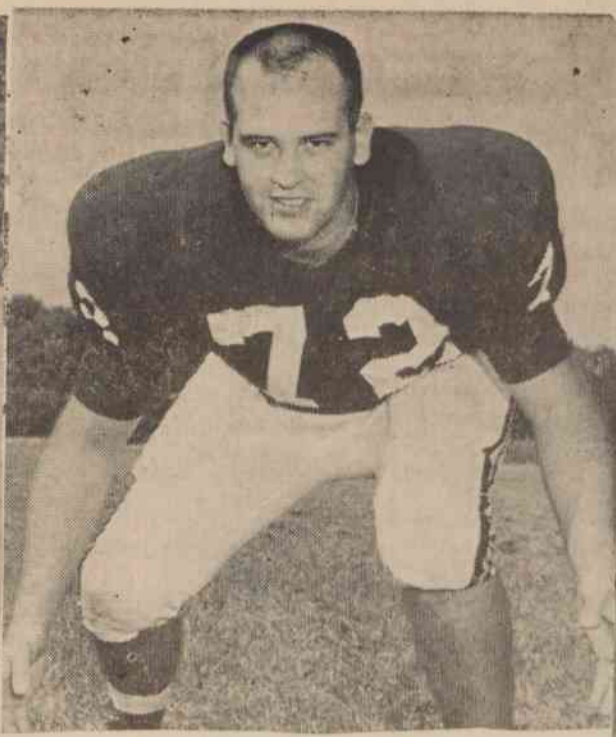
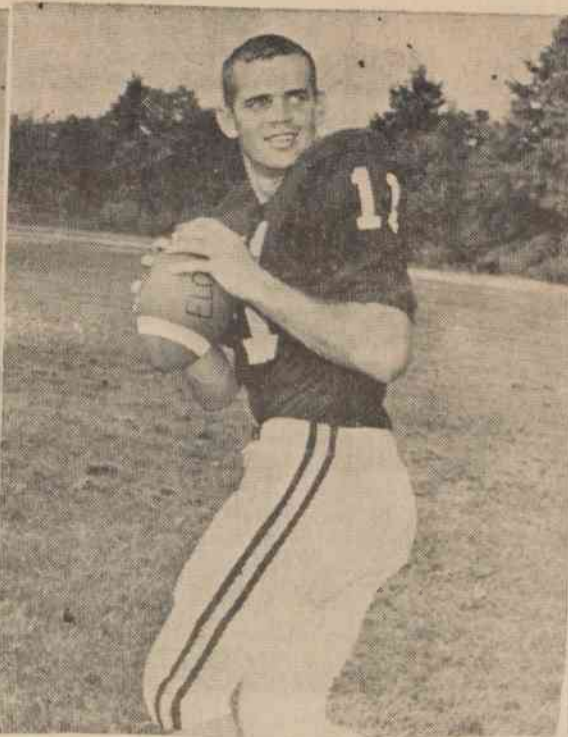


These Christian Seniors To End Grid Careers Against Frederick Lions Tomorrow Night

As Winter Season Nears . . .

Get Acquainted With Elon Cage Squad

King football will vacate the athletic throne on the Elon campus after this week's battle with the Frederick Lions in Portsmouth, Va., and King Basketball will pick up the sceptre and rule the sports interest of local sports fans through the winter season. It is thus appropriate that the Elon faculty, students and other fans should get acquainted with the boys who will carry Elon hopes on the hardwood this season.

Coach Bill Miller, who is starting his fourth season as head cage mentor for the Christians has a fine crew of veterans on hand to anchor his Elon quintet this winter, with a total of nine boys back in togs who played with last year's strong outfit, a team which won 19 of 30 battles and which annexed the championship of the annual Camp Lejeune Christmas Tournament. The Christians also gained the finals of the Fort Lee tourney and the semi-finals of the Conference title meet.

Practice has been underway since mid-October, and the Maroon and Gold cagers are reported to be in top shape as the opening contest with the Pfeiffer College Falcons draws near. The Christians have looked good in scrimmages with the Campbell College Camels and with the Quantico Leathernecks, and Coach Miller's boys should give a good account of themselves when they tackle the Falcons here on Saturday night, December 1st.

The Christian roster, as listed by Coach Miller, now includes fifteen boys. The individual players are presented in the following brief sketches in alphabetical order:

DEWEY ANDREW—Andrew, a rugged senior center and forward, hails from neighboring Snow Camp and stands 6-6 in height. He posted the Conference in scoring most of last year and wound up with a total of 615 points and an average of 21.2 points per game. He became the third player in Elon history to top the 600-point mark in a single season, joining Don Haltheox and Jug Irvin in the select group.

HOWARD ANDREW—The second of the Andrew brothers on the squad, and he stands an inch taller at 6-7 than his senior brother. The big boy played some fine ball and lettered as a freshman a year ago, when he saw service as a reserve at both forward and center. He hit 46 points while playing only as a reserve, and should be a fine scoring threat this winter.

MAC BOWMAN—Bowman, who was a member of the Christian squad two years ago, did not play

King basketball last winter and thus ranks as a basketball sophomore. The big boy, who played high school ball at Pleasant Grove, Va., stands 6-3 in height and should see much duty this season at forward.

JESSE BRANSON—Branson, a rugged sophomore letterman forward from Burlington, stands 6-7 in height and is one of the toughest boys under the backboards in Elon cage history. The big boy won high acclaim in the Carolinas Conference last winter, when he hit 438 points for an average of 14.8 points per game and also averaged better than 15 rebounds per game.

JIMMY CRUTCHFIELD—Crutchfield, who joins the Elon cage squad for the first time this year, is a junior in class standing and looms as a valuable addition to Coach Miller's roster. He stands 6-1 and is a fine ball handler from his guard position.

ARTHUR DAVIS—Davis, a sophomore letterman forward from Roanoke Rapids, is one of the most rugged boys on the entire squad, standing 6-3 in height and tipping the scales at a husky 210 pounds. He saw much duty as a reserve last winter and hit double figures in a number of games, winding up the season with 119 points and an average of better than five points per game. He is also a fine rebounder on both offense and defense.

RON DINHART—Dinhart, a sophomore guard from Linder, Ind., stands 6-1 in height and is a speedy lad who handles the ball well in the back court. He saw service only as a reserve and did not letter in his freshman year, but he promises to be a valuable member of the Christian squad this winter.

Elon Downs Newberry On Long Scoring Runs

The Fighting Christians ran their winning string to three games when they defeated the Newberry Indians 13 to 6 at Burlington Memorial Stadium on Saturday night, November 10th, with victory coming on two "home run scampers"

and a pair of "last-ditch" goal line stands by the Elon defense.

The Christians scored initially in the first period when Wayne Mahanes, Elon's talented right halfback, bounced through left tackle and scooted 77 yards to paydirt. George Wooten's kick was on the beam and with Elon was holding a 7 to 0 lead.

The Indians broke into the scoring column just before the end of that first frame when Tommy Gorman fired a 17-yard scoring strike to Jim Lowder for the touch down. The pass try for a two-pointer failed, and Elon still led by a point.

The Newberry TD was set up mainly by the throwing arm of Tom Gorman, who hit Phil Orsini, one of the top rushers in the Carolinas Conference, with a 18-yard bullet. An Elon pass interference penalty also figured in the Indian scoring drive, which covered 67 yards in all.

Midway in the second quarter Elon's George Wooten cut through the Newberry line on a quarterback sneak and "sneaked" 89 yards on the keeper play that added the Insurance touchdown and put Elon ahead by 13 to 6. Wooten's long jaunt was typical of the fine game he called, a game in which he piloted the Christians to a fantastic 332 yards off the ground.

Not all the honors, however, went to the Elon ball carriers, for Elon's great line rose up twice for tremendous goal-line stands. After the opening kick-off, the Indians drove to the Elon four, where they had a first-and-goal situation.

With our Fighting Christian gridders closing out their 1962 football campaign by meeting the Frederick College Lions in Portsmouth this weekend, it is time to look back on the most successful Elon football campaign of the past five years. With only the Frederick game remaining, the Maroon and Gold squad has a 6-3 record and is safely holding second spot in the Carolinas Conference.

It is the first time in half a decade that Elon has finished above the 500 percentage mark in the win-loss column, and a win over Frederick will place the squad with seven victories for the season, which will be the greatest number of wins for any Elon team since 1950. The Christians of 1950 won 7, lost 3 and tied one. That undefeated squad of 1957 won only six games, having two tilts cancelled by flu. In fact, the only Elon teams to win more than seven games in a year were in 1941 and 1949, when the Christians won eight tilts.

So, with one of the best records in Elon history in the books, it's a good time to review the entire season to date. Newport News was the scene of the opening game of this 1962 season, with the Fighting Christians meeting the Apprentice School eleven and coming out victorious by a 20 to 0 score. Highlighting this game was 74-yard run by freshman Gordon Cox in his first college game and the three pass-interceptions by George Wooten, a feat which matched an all-time Elon record.

The Christians then opened their Carolinas Conference season the following weekend by the defeating of Guilford Quakers 10 to 3 on the Quakers' own field, with the Elon line showing something of its power as it sparked the victory. It was a field goal by George Wooten and a touchdown by Gordon Cox in the final half that overcame an early Guilford lead, but special mention goes to Ed Fitzgerald for the recovery of a Guilford fumble on the Quaker twenty-eight that led to the winning fourth-quarter touchdown.

Penalties plagued the Christians in these two early tilts, and they continued to haunt the Elon outfit as it journeyed to Boone on

an ill-fated invasion that cost a 27 to 12 loss to the Appalachian Mountaineers. The Apps were all fired up by the dedication of their new stadium, and they took advantage of every break as they used Elon penalties and miscues to post their four TD's. Both Elon scores came on passes from George Wooten to Tart and Mahaffey.

Three games had been played on foreign fields, and still the home fans had not seen the Christians in action, but the Maroon and Gold eleven came home to Burlington Stadium for the fourth tilt to entertain the East Carolina Pirates, who were playing under Coach Stasavich, the former Lenoir Rhyne boss. There were those who doubted before the game, but the doubts were removed when Elon topped the Pirates 23 to 19 as Wayne Mahanes ran over two TD's and George Wooten sprinted over for another of his "miracle" scores in the final minute.

The Elon attack was still having sputtering spells when the Carson-Newman Eagles came to town and used tremendous speed on breakaway runs of 73 and 68 yards to defeat the Christians 22 to 20

Elon Closes Grid Year With Lions

The Fighting Christian football squad, which closes its 1962 campaign by meeting the Frederick Lions in Portsmouth, Va., tomorrow night, have already posted the most successful season which Elon has had in five years, but the Christians can claim had in five years, but the Christians can claim more victories than any Elon team since 1950 if the Maroon and Gold gridders top the Lions in this finale.

The 1950 Christians finished the year with a 7-2-1 record, and no other Elon team has won more than six games in a season since that time. Even the great 1957 team, which recorded Elon's only undefeated year in history, showed only six victories on its perfect score sheet. There were only eight teams scheduled for that 1957 season, and the games with Catawba and Western Carolina were cancelled
