

### Elon Cagers Top Belmont Abbey Quint

Ten quick points in the early minutes of the second half proved decisive as the maroon-clad Christians of Elon College grabbed a well-played 69 to 66 victory over a strong Belmont Abbey quint in a contest on Saturday night, December 8th.

The two towering outfits, well matched in height, battled tooth-and-nail through most of the first half, with the lead swapping hands several times before the home-standing Crusaders moved out to 33 to 29 advantage at the half-time.

Dewey Andrew and Jesse Branson, a pair of tall Christians, battled the Crusaders' Bill Ficke and Joe McDermott, a pair of 6-7 Belmont Abbey stars, bucket for bucket during this opening half, with Andrew and Branson gaining an edge in rebounding most of the way.

The Christians came back strong in the opening minutes of the second half, bucketing ten consecutive points before Belmont Abbey could score a point, and this quick drive shot the Elon quint ahead at 39 to 33. It was a lead from which Belmont Abbey could never recover.

The Crusaders allowed Dewey Andrew and Branson to get inside for baskets early in the game, and then, after the Belmont squad tightened its inside defense, Roland Miller and Dave Winfrey unlimbered the Elon long-range guns to hold the lead. Elon's Bill Morningstar went to the sidelines early with a pulled muscle, but Miller and Winfrey outgunned the Crusaders' back court men.

Dewey Andrew topped the Christian assault and led the scoring for both teams as he banged in 25 points, but he received able assistance from Roland Miller with 15 and Jesse Branson with 13 counters.

Big Dewey Andrew, Elon's All-Conference center, was once more the big gun in the Christian attack as he hit the bucket for ten field goals and a brace of free throws for 22 points, but the Christians ace again had to yield game scoring honors by a single point as Lloyd Turlington racked 23 counters for Guilford.

Roland Miller, Elon's Hoosier hotshot at guard, canned three straight long shots as Elon counted ten points in a row and moved to a 54-45 advantage. The rival teams then traded buckets down the stretch for the final Elon win.
