

ITK Winner Of Tag Grid Championship

The Iota Tau Kappa tag-football squad, by virtue of a 36 to 6 play-off win over the Cherries outfit, clinched the intramural grid title on the Elon campus for the 1963 season.

The ITK squad and the Cherries had finished the regular season play in a deadlock, each showing a record of eleven wins and one loss. In each case, the only defeat suffered was to the other.

The ITK gridders also grabbed high honors in the final statistics for the tag-league. Five of the ITK stars were among the top ten scorers in the league, and the ITK combination topped all teams in the league in scoring with a 34.5 point average per game.

The final regular-season standings, after the play-off had given the title to Iota Tau Kappa and dropped the Cherries to second spot, showed the other teams in the following order: Alpha Pi Delta, Kappa Psi Nu, Sigma Phi Beta Raiders, Stingrays, Sigma Mu Sigma, Smith Dorm, Aristocrats, Cash and Carry, Rat Pack and Fighting Freshmen.

The top five teams in scoring averages included Iota Tau Kappa with 34.8, Sigma Phi Beta with 28.2, Kappa Psi Nu with 27.7, Alpha Pi Delta with 26.0 and the Cherries with 22.2 points per game.

The best defensive records showed the Cherries topping the league with an average of 9.9 points to all opponents. Others in top five defensive units were Alpha Pi Delta with 10.2, Sigma Phi Beta with 11.0, Iota Tau Kappa with 13.0 and Kappa Psi Nu with 13.5.

The top individual scorers and their points were Frank Maness (Raiders), 82; Tom Piccinini (ITK), 80; Lefty Everett (ITK), 78; Billy Harding (ITK), 68; B. D. Schneider (Sigma Phi), 66; Joe Cote (Alpha Pi), 64; Carroll Monger (Kappa Psi), 62; Dennis Clinton (Cherries), 58; Bill Maness (ITK), 48; Bob LaRose (Kappa Psi), 48; and Joe Lee (ITK), 46.

The United States must be headed by strong and capable leadership. Let us hope that this strength can be found in President Lyndon Baines Johnson.

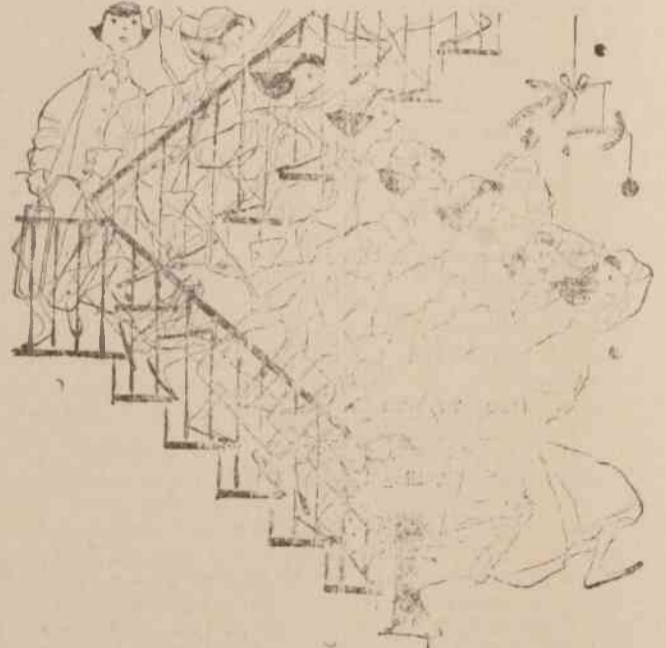
