Coach Bill Miller is starting his eighth season as the Christian basketball coach with what he considers may be one of his best teams. Miller thinks this team should greatly improve upon the 12-15 record of last year.

Not only will Elon be improved but so will many other teams in the conference. Guilford and Cacawba should have their best teams in history. Elon is also playing some very stiff competition outside the conference. On the schedule this year in addition are Conference foes Wofford, Campbell, Erskine, North Carolina A. and T. and Winston-Salem State. The Christian opener is with Wofford on November 29th, although the Elon cagers will actually get pre-season action in a tournament in Kentucky next week.

Practice for the cagers began around the middle of October. There were no seniors on the squad last year so Miller is not faced with the problem of filling empty slots left by graduation. Eight lettermen make up the nucleus of the 67-68 team. The reyear are Bill Bowes, Steve Caddell, Tommy Davis, Henry Goedeck, Mike Hailey, Noble Marshall, and Tom McGee. Bobby Atkins, the eighth letterman, was absent from the squad last year but has returned for his senior year. His return should help the guard situation.

The center position is solidly nailed down by Henry Goedeck, a 6-6, 215-pound junior from Central Islip, N.Y. Goedeck has been an outstanding per-

former, both as a shooter and rebounder, for the past two years. Flanking Goedeck at the forward posi-tions are Tommy Davis and Bill Bowes.

Davis, 6-4, 190-pounds, is one of the two senior players on the squad this year. Davis, who hails from Eden, can always be counted on for a steady performance.

Bowes, a 6-7, 225-pound junior, is from Lenox, Mass. After a rather slow start last year Bowes came around and played many fine games for the Christian five. Steve Caddell, a 6-4, 180-pound junior from Rocky Mount, should add reserve strength under the

Bobby Atkins will start at one guard position and should give the team the floor general and take charge man that was lacking last year. Atkins is a fine shooter and excellent ball handler. The other guard position is up for grabs. However, due to an injury to Noble Marshall, Tom McGee seems to be the likely choice to be a starting meta with Atking starting mate with Atkins.
